Williams, of the 149th Battalion. The ceremony was performed by Rev. H. J. Fair, of the Methodist church, Arkona, beneath a bower of bridal roses and lilies. The bride was given away by her father, C. W. Lucas.

The bridesmaid was Miss Lydia Lucas, sister of the bride. The duties of best man were performed by Private Alfred Williams, brother of the groom. The groom's gift to the bride was a check and the father's also a check. After congratulations the guests sat down to a sumptuous repast. The presents were numerous and costly. Capt. and Mrs. Williams left by auto for Goderich and points north, amid showers of confetti and with good wishes of their many friends. About 50 guests were present from Alvinston, Brooke, Warwick and Watford.

### Former Warwick Man Killed at the Front

The casualty list of June 15th records the death of Pte. Robert J. Bargar a former well-known and much respected Warwick man. Mr. Bargar was born on the east half of lot 12, con. 5, S. E. R., on March 6th, 1867, and still owns the property. He left here about 24 years ago and after residing for a time in several places settled in Toronto where he joined the colors and went overseas with the second contingent. He was always fond of soldiering, and served several years in the 27th Regt. under Capt. Carroll. His death, although the glorious one of a soldier fighting for freedom and the welfare of mankind, is much regretted by many warm friends in this vicinity. He leaves a wife and three grown-up children Gertrude M., Wm. J., and Cecil H. Bargar in Toronto. Mrs. D. Duncan, Mrs. Will Thorner and Mrs. H. Kerton are sisters of the deceased. Mrs. Duncan received the following letter from her brother after his death was reported:—

Belgium, May 20th, 1916.  
DEAR SISTER—In a few lines to let you know that I am in the best of health and spirits. I have been feeling pretty good ever since I was on leave. I had a good time with Jennie's friends over there. Jennie has nine cousins and nephews at the front. One is already killed, another 18 year-old one about to enlist. Then there is another Bargar and Harold Willoughby. I have been getting several letters from all three of you so I am sending each of you a letter to-day. The weather here was very wet late in April and early in May, but it has stopped raining now. The rye was all headed out a week ago, the hops are 8 feet tall, the clover 1½ feet tall and the grass still taller. Sorry about Russell but hope he is all right again. Well, if I were to write all the good news I could write the censors would get after it so I have to content myself with telling you that I am in great hopes that this war will be all over by August 4th, 1916, and that I am looking forward to a nice visit with you early in October 1916. Harold Willoughby looked me up. I saw him four times. I remain, as ever, your affectionate brother.—Bon.
