The rye was all headed out a week ago, the hops are 8 feet tall, the clover 1½ feet tall and the grass still taller. Sorry about Russell but hope he is all right again. Well, if I were to write all the good news I could write the censors would get after it so I have to content myself with telling you that I am in great hopes that this war will be all over by August 4th, 1916, and that I am looking forward to a nice visit with you early in October 1916.
