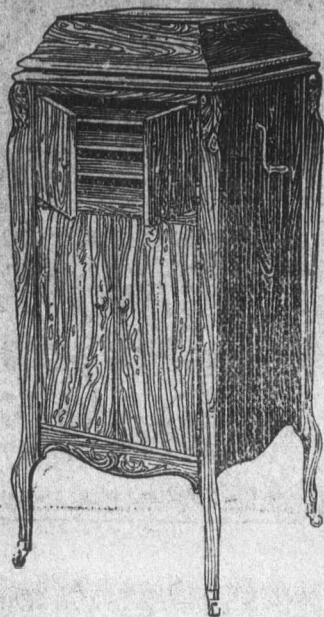
CHRISTMAS!

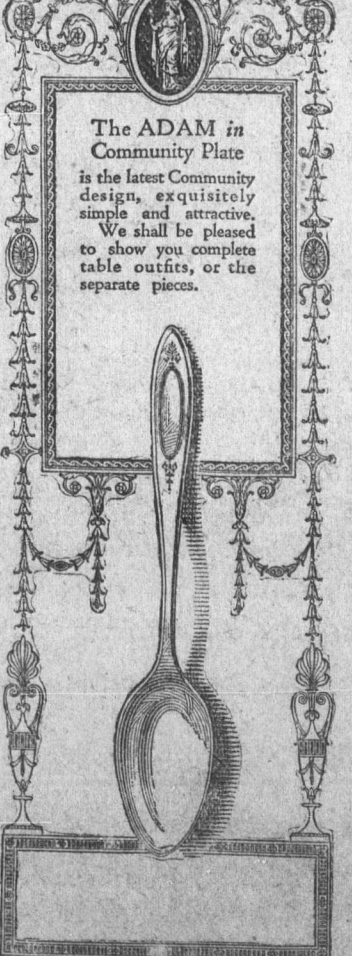
