 in the Saskatchew-
 District—Weather favorable and cut-
 ting well under way. Threshing
 should commence in some districts
 this week. Summer fallow crops will
 give a satisfactory yield, other crops
 below average. Manitoba District—
 Rain has interfered with harvesting
 but some points report cutting almost
 finished. Yields and grades will vary
 greatly in different localities owing to
 damage from rust.

Province of Quebec
 The hay crop has proved to be
 much larger than usual, but lower
 quality is reported owing to exces-
 sive rains. Barley and oats are being
 harvested and a heavy yield of both
 grain and straw is assured. Corn has
 benefited by warm weather, but will
 not measure up to the average. The
 potato prospects are good but rot is
 reported in low sections. Tobacco is
 fast ripening. Cutting has commenced
 and the quality is reported as excel-
 lent. In the northern districts, hail
 and rain have caused some damage.

Province of Ontario
 Farmers are busy with threshing
 and fall plowing. Fall wheat, barley
 and oats are yielding well above the
 average. Weather conditions ideal for
 corn, which has made splendid
 growth. Root crops are good. Winter
 apples and pears reported exception-
 ally good. Pastures and fall wheat
 lands require rain.


Maritime Provinces
 New Brunswick—Weather con-
 ditions somewhat improved, but lay-
 ing not yet completed. Potato pros-
 pects good. Early cobbles are being
 dug yielding about 70 barrels per
 acre. Nova Scotia—Recent fire weath-
 er beneficial and prospects good ex-
 cept for apples, which are only fair,
 due to excessive rain during the early
 summer, but fruit is coloring well.
 Prince Edward Island—Crop condi-
 tions generally good. Potato blight
 reported in some sections, but dam-
 age not serious.

Province of British Columbia
 Threshing general. Wheat and oats
 above average in Nicola Valley. Roots
 potatoes and other vegetables will
 not be up to average owing to long
 drought. Tomatoes good crop. Hops
 good average. Okanagan apple esti-
 mate increased to 60 per cent. of
 average. All fruit sizing and coloring
 well, and good quality generally.
 Pears 15 per cent. of average crop,
 plums and prunes 30 per cent.
