The general idea of the stamp is the same as in the old issue, but the design materially differs. The oval containing the Queen's portrait is larger and touches the outer line on all sides. It is a better picture of Her Majesty, and the oval being larger it shows to better advantage. The maple leaves have been left in the upper corners but have been replaced in the lower corner by figures.

There is nothing to find fault with, so Canada will likely be free from new issues for some time unless it is the intention of the Government to celebrate the different Agricultural Fairs by issuing a set of stamps for each.

Thanks to Bro. French's modesty, only part of the "fig leaves" were removed.

Cleaning Cancelled Stamps.

In a recent number of the Lone Star State Philatelist, there appeared an article, written by Mr. G. A. Hunt, entitled "How to Determine

Cancelled Stamps."

We are sorry to see that such articles should be allowed to be printed in any magazine. There is given, in this article, information whereby anybody is enabled to crase the cancellation marks from stamps so that the marks may be seen but very indistinctly. As a result, no doubt on account of this appearing in that journal and which was also copied by Mekeels Weekly Stamp News, we have received, lately remittances that contain stamps which have been attempted to be cleaned and will in all probability be used for postage by some unknowing persons.

We were surprised that such information should be given in a monthly journal, but we are still more surprised at the Stamp News reprinting such articles, which are a hindrance to the Government and may lead to some arrests being made at a later date. The penalty for passing these stamps is very heavy—the same as passing

counterfeit money.
