EXCHANGE OF NOTES (March 6, 1964) BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA CONCERNING WINTER MAINTENANCE OF THE HAINES-FAIRBANKS PIPELINE AND FOR THE ASSOCIATED WINTER USE AND MAINTENANCE OF PORTIONS OF THE HAINES ROAD.

Sir,

I have the honor to refer to the Exchange of Notes between the Secretary of State for External Affairs and the Ambassador of the United States dated January 16 and 17, 1957⁽¹⁾, which constitutes an agreement for the winter maintenance of the Haines-Fairbanks Pipeline and for the associated winter use and maintenance of portions of the Haines Road, as most recently extended and modified by the agreement contained in the Embassy's Note No. 141 of December 22, 1961, and the Department's reply of January 26, 1962⁽²⁾.

With the expiration on July 1, 1963 of the most recent agreement, it has become necessary to reach a new agreement. This should take into account the establishment in 1962 of a new pumping station and the recent developments, which were the subject of the Department's Note of October 24 and the Embassy's reply of October 30, 1963, concerning new arrangements for the clearance of the central portion of the road on an experimental basis during the 1963-64 winter season. Accordingly, I have the honor to propose that our Governments agree as follows:

- (a) The portion of the road between Haines Junction, Yukon Territory, and Mile 94 (Blanchard River Pumping Station) will be regularly cleared by an agency of the Canadian Government. All costs of this continuous winter maintenance will be reimbursed to the Canadian Government by the United States Army, Alaska;
- (b) The portion of the road between Mile 48 and the Alaska border (Mile 42) shall continue to be cleared by an agency of the United States Government or by the State of Alaska;
- (c) The appropriate agencies of the two Governments may make direct arrangements for the detailed implementation of the foregoing provisions.
