FOR GOVERNMENTS WHO WERE SO INTERESTED IN THEIR LEGAL JURISDICTION
THAT THEY LOST SIGHT OF THEIR COUNTRY. IT IS PAST TIME FOR US TO
BUILD TOGETHER AGAIN.

OBVIOUSLY, MORE MUST CHANGE THAN JUST THE ATTITUDE OF
GOVERNMENTS. OVER THE PAST DECADE, OTHER COUNTRIES, OTHER
ECONOMIES, HAVE BEEN PULLING AHEAD OF OURS, DESPITE OUR ABUNDANT
RESOURCES AND SKILLS. CONSIDER SOME STATISTICS. IN 1968, CANADA
EXPORTED MORE THAN THE JAPANESE; TODAY, JAPAN'S SHARE IS MORE THAN
DOUBLE OURS. AS AN EXPORTER, WE HAVE FALLEN FROM FOURTH TO
EIGHTH PLACE GLOBALLY. IN SEVENTY MANUFACTURING SECTORS, WE HAVE
GAINED MARKET SHARE ONLY IN FOUR, AND HAVE DECLINED IN TWENTY-ONE.

ANALYSIS OF PRODUCTIVITY TRENDS IS NO MORE ENCOURAGING.

BETWEEN 1970 AND 1981, CANADA WAS AMONG THE WORST PERFORMERS OF

THE MAJOR INDUSTRIAL COUNTRIES, IN TERMS OF GROWTH OF MANUFACTURING

OUTPUT PER PERSON EMPLOYED. FURTHERMORE, IN THE MANUFACTURING

SECTOR, THE COMBINATION OF RELATIVELY LOW OUTPUT AND HIGH

COMPENSATION PER HOUR OF LABOUR HAS FORCED UP OUR LABOUR COSTS PER

UNIT OF OUTPUT. THAT IS PARTICULARLY EVIDENT IN COMPARISON WITH

THE UNITED STATES. IT IS ALSO SIGNIFICANT THAT CANADA'S GROSS
