from her heart to the Speaker and members of her last Parliament and said "Though God hath raised me High, yet this I count the Glory of my Crown, that I have Reigned with your Loves". Now here in the new world I say to you that it is my wish that in the years before me I may so reign in Canada and be so remembered.

On this happy day when we give thanks to God for all that He has bestowed on us, I ask that He may bless and guide you.

Her Majesty's Secretary presented to the Honourable the Speaker a copy of the Speech from the Throne.

The Commons withdrew.

Her Majesty the Queen was pleased to retire.

The sitting was resumed.

The Honourable Senator Aseltine, for the Honourable Senator Haig, P.C., presented to the Senate a Bill (A), intituled: "An Act relating to Railways".

The Bill was read the first time.

The Honourable the Speaker informed the Senate that a copy of the Speech of Her Majesty the Queen had been left in his hands.

The Speech was read by the Honourable the Speaker.

The Honourable Senator Aseltine, for the Honourable Senator Haig, P.C., moved, seconded by the Honourable Senator Horner—

That the Speech of Her Majesty the Queen be taken into consideration on Tuesday, the 22nd October, 1957.

The question being put on the motion, it was— Resolved in the affirmative.

The Honourable Senator Aseltine, for the Honourable Senator Haig, P.C., moved, seconded by the Honourable Senator Macdonald, P.C.—

That a humble address be presented to Her Majesty conveying the loyalty and love of this House and of all her Canadian subjects, their joy in welcoming the presence in Canada of Her Majesty and His Royal Highness the Prince Philip, and their profound gratitude to Her Majesty for graciously opening Parliament and making of this day an historic occasion for all Canadians.

The question being put on the motion, it was— Resolved in the affirmative.
