

Dear Sir Arthur:

I am glad to have your letter of the 29th of January, and to learn from it there is no disadvantage to a student entering McGill because he is without a knowledge of the French language.

I am enclosing you herewith a clipping from the Yarmouth Herald. It is the opinion of some that unfair steps are being taken to carry on a propaganda for the introduction of French in some of our Provincial schools, and this statement, in view of your contradiction, looks to be somewhat of that nature.
