This volume is announced as "soon to appear," in June 1897. II.

In a well conceived article, "John Cabot, an Anniversary Study," based upon this book, in *Blackwood's Edinburgh Magazine*, June 1897, clxi. 838-851, (954.21.161), it is stated that "Mr. Weare makes the interesting suggestion that Cabot reached the mainland and was there met and killed by Alonso de Hojeda, who, with La Cosa, the map maker, as chief pilot, and Amerigo Vespucci as one of his 'useful companions,' set sail for the North in the spring of 1499. We might thus explain the presence, in La Cosa's map of 1500, of English flags on territory of greatly wider extent than that discovered by Cabot in the 1497 voyage. But all this is conjecture;"—a conjecture which will not have been in vain if it draws from Mr. HARRISSE a serious statement of his opinion thereon.
