Among fur-b-aring animals the fox family is noted for the variety of its colors, which seems to follow no laws as to species or locality. The typical fox of England appears in different shades of red, and white and black foxes have been known to occur. There are gray and yellow foxes in Europe, and one variety has black fur on the underparts of its body, where the animal usually has white fur. The coat of the Arctic fox may change color with the seasons, becoming a bluegray or white in the winter and darker gray to slate or brown in the summer. But this is not a fixed law in the nature of the animal, and an attempt has been made on the Pryblioff Islands, off the coast of Alaska, to breed foxes that will take on the blue-gray winter coat of fur. This is the valuable Blue Fox fur. In Prince Edward Island farming the Black Fox has been successfully undertaken. The Silver Fox, a rare animal, having a luxuriant black coat tipped with pure white silvery hairs, is supposed to be a cross between the white and black fox.

The fox fur mostly used in Cansada is caught by trappers and hunters who trade with the Hudson Bay Company. Valuable petts are also occasionally secured by settlers in the newer parts of Ontario. In the wilds the fox preys on animals of the rat and weasel family, birds and eggs. It is not adverse to a meal of carrion. It is most destructive to poultry and will kill every bird in a hen house during one short, stealthy visit.

Fox skins are made up into a variety of capes, stoles collar and hoa effects. The fulness and lightness of the fur make it particularly well suited for muffs. We have fox sets in every variety, including blue and silver skins.
