RUSSIANS PIERCED AUSTRIAN POSITION

Enemy Says Timely Arrival of Reinforcements Prevented Disaster.

GET ACROSS DNIESTER

German Force Captures Hill Near Halicz After Desperate Fighting.

(Continued From Page 1).

ere ready for a counter-offensive in northern Galicia.

The Russians, however, appear to have the situation in hand on the Dniester and are making a stubborn resistance. Judging by the number of prisoners taken they appear to have the best of the fighting. Battle at Przasnysz.

A desperate battle began by the Germans taking the offensive at Przasnysa Friday and it has continued without any result, the Russians report, but Berlin reports that the situation is unchanged on the eastern theatre, indicating that the Germans are making no

progress before Warsaw. The Russians who were forced to give way in the Orzyc Valley owing o the destruction of a redoubt by terrific German artillery fire counter attacked on Friday night and recaptured the work and five machine guns.

The attempted offensive of the enemy in the Omulew Valley, on the Narew front, Thursday, caused him severe losses, the Russians report. He left rows of bodies in front of the Russian trenches and the number of prisoners was increased to 150. A German battalion was annihilated by the Russian fire northwest of the Town of Zawichost, when it approached the Russian entanglements.

To Be in Warsaw Today. A Reuter cable from Petrograd says: "Papers found on Austrian and Ger-man prisoners show that the troops under Field Marshal Von Hindenberg were assured by their commander that we shall enter Warsaw June 28; Galicia will be entirely cleared of Russians by June 30 and after that peace can be concluded with Russia.'

Not since the war began has the English public been so convinced that it will be a long one. Those who took this view months ago were called pessimists, but now it is generally admitted that the Russian armies must fight for months to come under tremendous disadvantages, and that in the meantime the much heralded big general movement on the western front must be indefinitely postponed, while the entente powers thoroly reorganize

their methods.

While the campaign for munitions in Great Britain is at its height, it must be assumed that Germany is straining every fibre to the same end, and calling into play her inventive skill, so as to increase the deadly me-chanisms of war to offset the the inevitable and terrible drain on her men. The present consensus of opinion among military writers in London is tering ram stroke toward Warsaw, in

an endeavor to seize that city and the whole line of the Vistula. The line of offensive now directed from the Przasnysz region is along the valleys of the Omulew and Orzyc, tributaries of the River Narew, which flows across north Poland and joins the bend of the Vistula above War-The Russians checked the drive on the Ormulew and Orzyc Rivers.

RUSSIANS COVER RETREAT

COLOGNE, via London, June 27 .-The Russians are covering the retreat of their armies from Galicia by a vigorous defense along the middle cours of the Dniester rather than to the north of Lemberg, because the ground in the district where they are now making a stand offers greater natural advantages, according to an explanaion of the present situation printed
