troducing measures to the detriment and danger of our liberties. Heaven forbid I should lay to heavy a charge at their door ! I know there are many of them men, as yet, of free and upright principles. But they will give me leave to obferve, that in this CONSTITUTION, founded on the widest basis of political and civil liberty, perhaps the only way of fapping its foundation, is to corrupt by degrees those pillars which support it; and it is not the measure of a weak politician, to endeavour to compass his ends, by means, which, at first, appear fair and well intention'd. The reafon, I understand, the m-gives for purfuing this measure, is, "the union of parties; the larger the " fource of bounty in the Crown, the more general will be its " dues." This may be plaufible reafoning; but the fact is, and of this I confess myself jealous, that by these pensions the Crown has increas'd its influence in the House of Commons; and, with regard to the act of Queen Anne, if a lift of new created places should, as was done the beginning of the late reign, be order'd to be laid upon the table of the House of Commons, I cannot fee but that these of the supernumerary officers of the Household must be of the number; otherwise the Crown may, on any future emergency, create as many as shall then be found necessary to answer the purposes of the m----.

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
