## HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

### MAY BUILD A RADIAL LINE TO PORT DOVER

Survey Made For Toronto Capitalists—Superintendent Rogers' Name Forged to Cheque.

HAMILTON, July 7.—(Special).—Talk of construction of the electric railway from here to Port Dover, a charter for which was granted several years ago, has been revived here. E. G. Barrow, former city engineer, is authority for the statement that a rough survey of the road has been made for Toronto capitalists, who are thinking of building the line.

The spurious signature of Joseph E. Rogers, superintendent of provincial police, appended to a \$50 cheque on the Hamilton branch of the Bank of Montreal, was the means of a smooth transaction obtaining \$17 worth of worldly goods and \$33 in real money from the clerk of the New American Hotel here on Tuesday. The local and provincial police were notified of the fraud, but the crook has not been apprehended.

### LAYING FOR CASTRO

Venezuelan Government Sends Troops on Warship.

CARACAS, Venezuela, July 7.—The Venezuelan Government, in order to be in readiness for any eventuality that may arise thru the landing on the Guajira Peninsula, of Cipriano Castro, the exiled ex-president of the republic, yesterday dispatched two heavy armed troops thither on board the warship Gen. Toquillo. Gen. Patro Gomez, a brother of President Gomez, commands the troops and has instructions to watch out for Castro.

The sole topic of conversation to-day among the representatives of the South American republics who have been attending the celebration of Venezuela's century of independence, was concerning Castro's latest escapade. All of them expressed the opinion that it is foolhardy, and that it will be difficult for the ex-president to reach his proposed destination in the Andes.

## GERMANY WAITING FOR FRANCE TO MAKE MOVE

Russian Ambassador Enquires Concerning Germany's Intentions in Morocco.

BERLIN, July 7.—The Russian ambassador called to-day at the foreign office and had a long talk with Baron von Kiderlin-Waechter, the foreign secretary. He had been directed by Emperor Nicholas to enquire in a friendly spirit concerning Germany's intentions in Morocco.

There has been no intimation of what Germany's pretensions will be in the event of a well-informed and friendly diplomat, that the fulfilment of her participation in railroad and industrial concessions in Morocco, and the extension of the Kamerun-Congo Railroad, while in anti-Germany diplomatic circles, the opinion is expressed that Germany first will try to secure a position in South Morocco and fall back upon a demand for railroad concessions if she should fail therein. The brunt of the opposition to the first proposition would, it is believed, rest with Great Britain, since France is less concerned over Germany securing a foothold on the Atlantic coast of Morocco.

The Lokal Anzeiger makes what is apparently an inspired comment to-day on Premier Aegidius's declaration that a situation had arisen in Morocco which British interests might be affected more directly than heretofore, and that Great Britain in her treaty obligations toward France.

The paper takes a reassuring view of the English position, saying that Mr. Aegidius favors a policy of moderation and calm, common sense and that his statement indicates that the British Government will pursue a more active policy than heretofore, and be guided by the interests of Great Britain rather than by the Moroccan entente.

The local Grand Trunk officials could give no definite information about the rumored deal.

## ORANGEMEN ARE AROUSED

Declare Parades in Ottawa and Hull Should Be Held.

Local members of the Orange Order scout the idea that any attempts will be made to prevent the Orangemen's parades in Ottawa and Hull on the glorious twelfth.

"Why shouldn't they parade?" asked one prominent Orangeman. "Isn't this a free country—a British colony? There are a lot of Irish and French in that section of the country, who naturally would resent any Orange demonstrations, from racial reasons, if from no other. But it's all talk. The Orangemen are going to walk, and everybody knows it. Protection will be given them, too, for even the Eucharistic procession last year in Montreal was guarded by police and volunteers. How could one believe that Orangemen in Canada would be denied privileges given to Catholics?"

"This is a free country and people can parade in lawful assembly. The statutes of both Ontario and Quebec warrant that. But these insinuations that the Orangemen will be molested if they parade on July 12, comes in bad grace and bad taste. Of course it's all brought about by a lot of hot-headed Nationalists trying to stir up trouble. But it is not long since the Eucharistic congress and procession last year in Montreal were treated by the Orange fraternity."

"Yes, the Orangemen can walk any place on the 12th of July and I don't think there will be the slightest interference in Ottawa and Hull in spite of all reports to the contrary."

## WHERE DIAMONDS LIE

Peculiar Conditions Surround Gems Found in Oval Rocky Steins.

In the South African diamond fields the gems are found in what are called "pipes," which are round or oval steins of a peculiar kind of rock, several acres in extent at the top, and running down to unknown depths into the earth. Near the surface this rock, which is rich in iron, is disintegrated by exposure to the weather, and assumes a yellowish color. The precious pebbles are readily extracted from the friable rock.

Deeper down the "pipe" changes character, explains Harper's Weekly. The rock becomes a comparatively hard blue mass, much more difficult to work. Yet it is still sprinkled thru with diamonds, lying embedded in the moulds where nature made them. This blue rock has to be exposed to the weather, or treated with water, before it will yield up its treasures.

Nor is it clear from the nature and appearance of the diamond-bearing rock that it is of volcanic origin, and the "pipes" are evidently the necks of ancient volcanoes, whose fires died out probably thousands of years ago. When we consider that the diamond burns and is consumed at a high temperature, we cannot think that the gems contained in these ancient pipes of rock were brought there from the interior of the earth while the rock was in a molten condition.

It is far more probable that, under peculiar conditions of pressure and temperature, they were formed where they are now found while the rock was cooling off. It remains to be learned what the real conditions of their formation were.

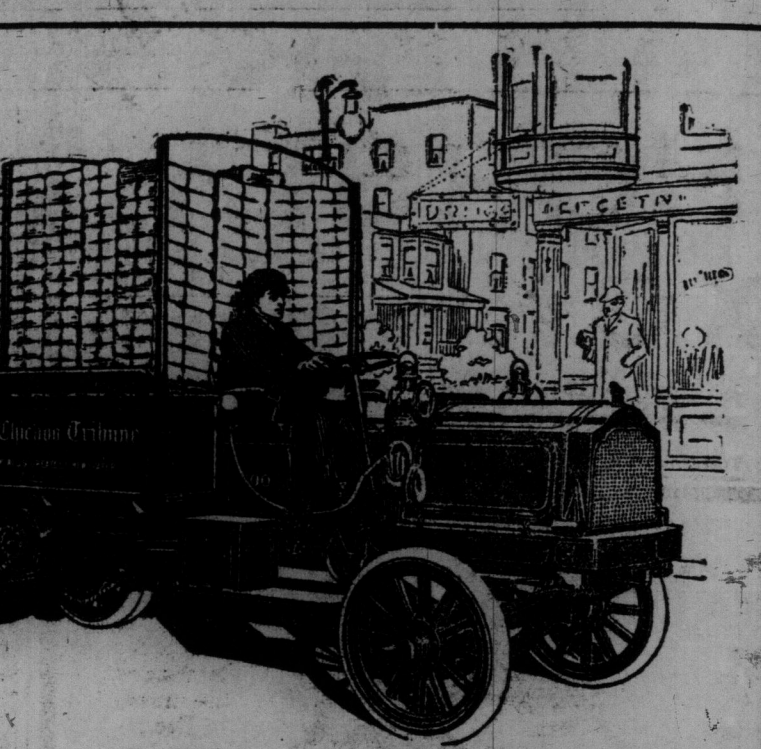
## Those German Soldiers.

"Two features of the spring parade at Potsdam," says a German magazine writer, who witnessed the annual military function, "excited general interest. One was the appearance of the Princess Victoria, Louise in the uniform of colonel riding at the head of her regiment, the 2nd Hussars, and the other the review of the Foot Guards. Marching at sixty front, four deep, before the Stadtkirche, to the music of a monster band, the thousand soldiers moved with the precision and exactness of so many machines. The uniform was dark coats, glistening helmets and snow white trousers. Every line of arms and uniform was perfectly aligned, save the white legs, which moved forward in the equally perfect goose step."

Any summer beverage made from fruit juice or any kind of punch may be turned into a granita by the process of freezing until a snowy consistency is reached. The frosted sides of the freezer toward the middle of the liquid should be scraped several times during the freezing process. 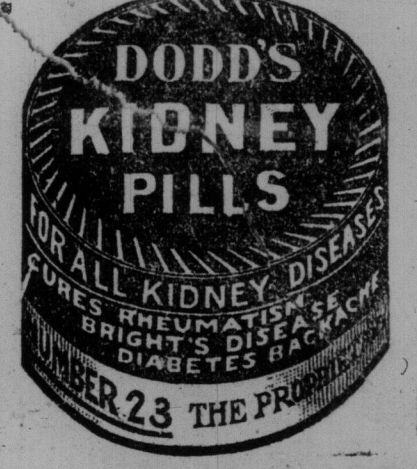
