CHARGED WITH BIGAMY

Fred Arnot and Ethel Baker Before Brockville Court.

BROCKVILLE, Ont., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—Fred J. Arnot and Ethel May Baker, the Ogdensburg couple charged with bigamy, were given a preliminary hearing in the police court here.

Mrs. Arnot, No. 1, who now resides at Carthage, N.Y., forced the prosecution. She testified that she and Arnot were married on Nov. 2, 1901, and that their family consisted of two children. She produced a number of letters found secreted in the cellar of their home, which Miss Baker had written to Arnot, the correspondence covering several months past.

The crown attorney produced a certificate record of the marriage of Arnot and Miss Baker, performed in Brockville on July 4, by Rev. Thomas Brown. The prisoners were then committed for trial.

In court, Arnot expressed a desire to converse with Mrs. Arnot No. 1, but the woman indignantly refused to recognize either him or the girl prisoner. Both women appeared to be laboring under much strain when brought face to face.

HAMILTON MOTORIST FINED FOR SPEEDING

Magistrate Will Try to Get License Canceled—Hydro Bugaboo Goes Bang—Coroner's Inquest.

HAMILTON, Aug. 11.—(Special.)—Magistrate Jelfs in the police court this morning handed a young Hamilton motorist a fine of \$20 for fast driving, and another fine of the same amount for not carrying a rear light on his motor car. The young man, Deane, then, to remove any lingering doubt of his disapproval of the young man's conduct, the magistrate announced that he would write the proper authorities and endeavor to have Deane's license revoked.

"I do not consider you a proper person to have a license," the magistrate told the autolite.

Chief Hanel of the Beach police force and P. C. Berlinghoff swore that Deane had recklessly sped his car along the sand strip at night without the proper lights and that he and a companion had been driving.

Bugaboo Exploded.

Another hydro bugaboo was exploded by Mayor Lees today when he explained the city's recent claim of \$307 against the hydro commission for lack of power in July.

In the city contract, as in the contracts of all other municipalities in the hydro scheme, there is a proviso that for failure to supply power the Ontario Power Commission shall be penalized to the extent of twelve times the cost of the power not delivered.

A misinterpretation of the contract caused the city engineer to confuse the words "company" and "commission," with the result that a claim was filed against the hydro commission for twelve times \$23.67, the price of the power which the city failed to receive.

The company was responsible for the condition which made the delivery of power impossible, and as the commission is a co-operative body, cannot be held liable.

G. T. R. PAYS \$1,025,000 FOR GOVT. PROPERTIES

Bulk of Central Prison and Asylum Lands go to Railway—Arrangement With Massey-Harris.

The long anticipated sale of the Central Prison and asylum properties on Queen-street, has taken place at last. Although for several weeks it has been practically certain that the Grand Trunk Railway and Massey-Harris Company were the prospective purchasers, nothing official was disclosed until yesterday afternoon, when the following statement was given out from the office of Hon. Dr. Reame, minister of public works:

"The Ontario Government has disposed of the bulk of the Central Prison and asylum properties on Queen-street, for which tenders were invited some time ago, to the Grand Trunk Railway for \$1,025,000. The Grand Trunk Railway has entered into some arrangement with the Massey-Harris Company, by which the latter secure a portion of the asylum grounds for their works. According to the terms of the arrangement, the railway will give possession from time to time of such portions as they may be in a position to vacate. The part lying outside the asylum walls, covering about eight acres, has already been turned over to the purchasers. A small block on Queen-street was sold to another purchaser for \$15,000. The remaining two lots, including the one known as the old pumping station, are still retained by the government."

It is understood that the Grand Trunk will erect a line of freight sheds on a portion of the property.

MINING AND STRIPPING IRON ORE

Iron ore is taken from the ground in two ways, mining and stripping, or mining and "farming," as one old miner in Duluth puts it.

It goes without saying that where the ore lies near the surface, the cheaper way is to take off the overburden and then load the ore from the pit directly into railroad cars.

Striping in the United States is practiced principally on the Mesabi Range, where 125 feet has been removed near at hand, the cableway is used for stripping, but where a haul on cars is necessary, the steam shovel is probably the more economical.

With a shovel the earth is loaded directly into small dump cars of 100,000 pounds capacity, in which it is taken to the lake ports, if the ore is to be shipped by water.

The cost of mining varies with the location. On the old ranges ore is valued at about \$1.5 a ton, this figure including mining, but where exclusive of taxes. On the Mesabi Range the cost of mining ore is about 90c per ton, while it costs about 30c per ton for stripping, bringing the ore to the surface or the ore to the surface after stripping ore is paid. A reasonable cost for the average Lake Superior ore ready for shipment from the mines is in the neighborhood of \$1.25 per ton.
