Special to The Toronto World. Ottawa, Feb. 11.-Ottawa will soon have to hang out the sign, "Standing room only." It is already a problem where the senators, members of parlament and sessional employes, numbering, all told, 1000 people, are to eat and sleep. The city is crowded now to capacity, and yet hundreds and hundreds of people will be here seeking accommedations next week.

Usually there is room at the top. In any city, however crowded, you can generally get a place to sleep and plenty to eat if you are willing to pay the price. But just now in Ottawa ments are densely crowded. The capital city is swarming with highpalaried officials, who are willing and perhaps required to live at the top of the heap. "Boards" and "commissions" have multiplied beyond number, and extravagant salaries as a rule are paid. Fifty dollars a week seems to be the minimum wage, and you meet men here from all over the country who are domiciled in Ottawa as officials or employes of this, that the other board or commission at

"Spend and spare not" is the rule in Ottawa. Not long ago a well-known woman was appointed to one of these commissions, and on arriving at Ot-tawa was asked whether she preferred a salary or a living allowance.
