Winnipeg, June 28.—(Special.)—The Free Press editorially replies to the statement in The Winnipeg Tribune, that now that Manitoba has returned a majority of Conservatives, it will serve the province right if it has separate schools fastened on it. The Free Press thus concludes: "It would be just as well that our 'anti-coercion' friends should frankly face the situation as it really is. Mr. Laurier is bound, just as Sir Charles Tupper was round, to remedy the grievance of the minority here. He will do this as he promised, and as he is bound to do.
