London, Nov. 25.—This morning's despatches from South Africa show that the recent fighting near Villiersdorp, southwest of Standerton, concerning which Lord Kitchener reported nothing beyond the fact that Commandant Bush had been captured, after attacking a patrol of 100 railroad pioneers, was really a serious affair.

London, Nov. 25 .- With reference to the story that the British placed Boer women and children in front during the fighting at Graspan, June 6, when General Dewet's convoy was captured—a story which has been spread broadcast on the Continent as an example of British barbarity-The Daily Mail sent a despatch of enquiry to Lord Kitchener, who replied as follows: "The statement is absolutely untrue and devoid of all foundation. One child was killed and one woman and one child were wounded by the Boers."

As the story has been prominent in the recent anti-Chamberlain campaign in Germany, The Daily Mail has telegraphed Lord Kitchener's reply to all the leading German papers.

CHAMBERLAIN'S CHARGE TRUE. London, Nov. 23 .- The Earl of Durham, speaking at Durham tonight in reference to the ill-feeling toward Great Britain in Germany on account of Colonial Secretary Chamberlain's remarks in his Edinburgh speech, said that the British people could not fail to resist attacks because they had no foundation and showed a want of appreciation of their character and a great misapprehension as to their behavior. Secretary Chamberlain, Lord Durham said, might better have

left his words unsaid, but he told the truth. Lord Durham, referring to the Right Hon. Henry Campbell-Bannerman's speech, in which he accused the British troops of barbarous and loathsome behavior, said that if Sir Henry believed that he was a fool. If he only said it for party purposes, he was a knave.


