THE KAISER'S OUTING. Madrid, Nov. 10 .- Inquiries made here Emperor of Germany to Spain shows notified that two German warships, one of them having the Emperor and Empress of Germany on board, will arrive at Cadiz on Nov. 20, but it is claimed it is not yet known whether the visit of their majesties is of a private or of an official character. It is asserted at the foreign office that Emperor William and Empress Augusta Victoria, after visiting Cadiz, will visit Cartegena. The queen regent will invite them to visit Madrid.

AT DAMASCUS. Damascus, Nov. 10.—The visit of Emperor William and the Empress Augusta Victoria to Damascus has proved most successful and interesting. Their majesties have visited the principal sights. This afternoon Emperor William reviewed 6,000 men of the Turkish garrison, the review ending with a picturesque fantasia by Bedouins mounted on horses and camels. This evening a grand banquet was given in the emperor's honor. The city was brilliantly illuminated, and the streets and squares were filled with enthusiastic crowds. Emperor William has telegraphed to the sultan an expression of his great gratification at the cordiality of the welcome.

WITHOUT WATER. London, Nov. 10 .- The Herts County Council are alarmed at the serious injury which is being done to the water supply of the country by the enormous quantity abstracted from it by London water companies, and are memorializing the local government board on the subject. The great spring at Wellmer's Park, which formerly yielded 1,000,000 gallons a day, is dry, and and the numerous wells on the high-ways are completely dry. The situa-

tion is regarded as serious. LOTTIE COLLINS' RASH ACT. London, Nov. 10.—Lottie Collins, the music hall singer, who came into prominence in the popularity of "Ta-ra-ra Boom de Aye," attempted to commit suicide yesterday by opening a vein in her throat with a penknife. She was taken to the hospital, where it was found that her wounds were not serious, and she was taken to her home. It appears Miss Collins attempted suicide in her bathroom. Soon after she had entered it her servant heard piercing shrieks, and found the singer on the floor covered with blood, flowing from wounds in her neck. Miss Collins' attempt at self-destruction is attributed to the fact that domestic troubles have been preying upon her mind.

RECRUITING IN CANADA. London, Nov. 10.-It is learned from the war office that there is nothing particularly recent in the recruiting order for the Hundredth Regiment (Royal Canadians) in Canada. Sir Ralph Henry Knox, permanent under secretary of state for war, today said that the order to recruit the Hundredth Regiment in Canada was issued some time ago, and for the reason that a battalion of the regiment was stationed there. No new order has been issued. He expressed the opinion that the less said about such matters the better. Months ago, said he, Lord Lansdowne, secretary of state for war, contemplated the improvement of the defenses of all the colonies, but complications which have arisen in Europe caused people to draw wrong conclusions regarding present preparations for defense.

DISASTERS DUE TO FOG. Glasgow, Nov. 10.—A fog is prevailing on the Clyde which has caused a number of disasters to shipping. The Allan Line steamer Scandinavian, Capt. Eastaway, from Boston for this port, grounded just above Bowling last evening, when upward bound, as previously reported, and may have to lighten before she can be floated.

The Anchor liner Furnessia. Harris, from New York, also for here, and reported aground, was attempting to pass the Scandinavian and fouled her. Both steamers are reported to be damaged. Several other steamers are reported to be aground or fog-bound near by.

Lockroy's denial, there is little doubt that London, Nov. 10 .- Advices received the news of French naval preparations here from Shan Tung say that yellow is in the main correct. Admiral Four-

THE PEACE CONFERENCE IN PARIS. Paris. Nov. 10.-The newspapers of

Each side, up to the present, has made its own written translations, but the Americans alone have sapplied an interpreter, for the joint sessions, the Spaniards relying on the American interpreter instead of furnishing an interpreter for their side, as they might have expected to do. The American interpreter is Mr. Arthur Ferguson, and the Spaniards have marveled at the !acility with which he did his work. They have never once checked him or corrected him in the slightest degree. # SPANISH PRESS

At the Doings of the United States Commissioners.

Rupture of Negotiations Expected-Dons Will Yield Only to Force.

Paris, Nov. 10 .- Regarding yesterday's meeting the Figaro says: "The American commissioners contented themselves with producing a long memorandum, written in English. After having deposited this upon the table. Cairo, Nov. 10 .- Major Marchand and they left the task of translating it to the Spanish commissioners, apologizing courteously for its length and the difficulties of translation. They then retired. The situation at present is as follows: The Americans persist in refusing to take over the Cuban debt, and exact the cession of the Philippines. The Spaniards, on their side, refuse to

cede the archipelago." The Petit Bleu remarks: "All diplomatic forms were outraged by the Americans at yesterday's sitting. It is customary in such cases to read the memorandum presented to the other side. The Americans, however, contented themselves with throwing it,

written in English, upon the table. Continuing, the Petit Bleu says: "A member of the Spanish commission has remarked that his colleagues can never admit the claims of America in regard to the Philippines. The protocol says the treaty of peace shall determine the disposition and control of the Philip pines, and the Americans now claim that 'disposition' means that the colony shall be surrendered to America This Spain will never admit." The Petit Bleu then expresses its belief in an early rupture of the negotia-

The Rappel says: "A Spanish commissioner has declared that the Spanish will yield only to force in the question of the Philippine Islands.' Continuing, the Rappel asserts that it anticipates a rupture of the negotiations at an early date, adding: "The country which started out as the liberator of Cuba now threatens war, although her demands as to Cuba have been acceded to, because she cannot annex territory which played no part in the bringing on of the war. We preferred the liberator of Cuba to the

oppressor of Spain."
The Gaulois presents a long argument in favor of Spanish retention of the Philippine Islands, saying among other things that the Spaniards refuse absolutely to admit even in principle the cessation of their authority in the Philippine Islands, adding that the outcome is likely to be a rupture of the negotiations, followed by the occupation of the Philippine Islands by the American troops. As a final eventuality the Gaulois intimates that there might be a possibility of European intervention, although the paper doubts this, in view of the differences which divide France, Great Britain and Russia. Germany alone, according to the Gaulois, seems disposed to offer aid to Spain, saying: "The expected arrival of Emperor William at Cadiz, and his probable visit to the queen regent are sufficiently significant indications of his friendly disposition to Spain."
