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SUFFERING CELESTIALS

Flood and Famine Menace 1,000,000 Persons in Shang Tung.

The Kaiser's Proposed Visit to Spain.

Lottie Collins Makes an Attempt at Suicide—Hertford, Eng. Without Water—Imperial Penny-Postage Begins on Christmas Day.

London, Nov. 10.—Advices received here from Shan Tung say that yellow River has left its bed near the city of Tai Nan Fu, capital of Shan Tung Province, and flooded 2,000 square miles of territory, hundreds of villages have been destroyed, 1,000,000 are suffering, and famine is imminent.

THE KAISER'S OUTING.
 Madrid, Nov. 10.—Inquiries made here concerning the proposed visit of the Emperor of Germany to Spain shows that the Spanish Government has been notified that two German warships, one of them having the Emperor and Empress of Germany on board, will arrive at Cadiz on Nov. 20, but it is claimed it is not yet known whether the visit of their majesties is of a private or of an official character.

It is asserted that the foreign office of the Emperor William and Empress Augusta, Victoria, after visiting Cadiz, will visit Cartagena. The queen regent will invite them to visit Madrid.

AT DAMASCUS.
 Damascus, Nov. 10.—The visit of Emperor William and the Empress Augusta Victoria to Damascus has proved most successful and interesting. Their majesties have visited the principal sights. This afternoon Emperor William reviewed 6,000 men of the Turkish garrison, the review ending with a picturesque fantasia by Bedouin mounted on horses and camels. This evening a grand banquet was given in the emperor's honor. The city was brilliantly illuminated, and the streets and squares were filled with enthusiastic crowds. Emperor William has telegraphed to the sultan an expression of his great gratification at the cordiality of the welcome.

WITHOUT WATER.
 London, Nov. 10.—The Herts County Council are alarmed at the serious injury which is being done to the water supply of the county by the enormous quantity abstracted from it by London water companies, and are memorializing the local government board on the subject. The great spring at Welham's Park, which formerly yielded 1,000,000 gallons a day, is dry, and many other springs have either failed or been reduced in volume. More-over the heads of the rivers are lower down in the valleys than ever before, and the numerous wells on the high-lands are completely dry. The situation is regarded as serious.

LOTTE COLLINS' RASH ACT.
 London, Nov. 10.—Lottie Collins, the music hall singer, who came into prominence in the popularity of "Ta-ra-ra Boom de Aye," attempted to commit suicide yesterday by opening a vein in her wrist with a penknife. She was taken to the hospital, where it was found that her wounds were not serious, and she was taken to her home. It appears Miss Collins attempted suicide in a fit of nervousness. Soon after she had entered it her servant heard piercing shrieks, and found the singer on the floor covered with blood, flowing from wounds in her neck. Miss Collins' attempt at self-destruction is attributed to the fact that domestic troubles have been preying upon her mind.

RECRUITING IN CANADA.
 London, Nov. 10.—It is learned from the war office that there is nothing particularly recent in the recruiting order for the Hundredth Regiment (Canadian) in Canada. Sir Ralph Henry Knox, permanent under-secretary of state for war, today said that the order to recruit the Hundredth Regiment in Canada was issued some time ago, and for the reason that a quantity of the regiment was stationed there. No new order has been issued. He expressed the opinion that the less said about such matters the better. Months ago, said he, Lord Lansdowne, secretary of state for the colonies, contemplated the improvement of the defenses of all the colonies, but complications which have arisen in Europe caused people to draw wrong conclusions regarding present preparations for defense.

DISASTERS DUE TO FOG.
 Glasgow, Nov. 10.—A fog is prevailing on the Clyde which has caused a number of disasters to shipping. The Allan Line steamer Scandinavian, Capt. Eastaway, from Boston for this port, grounded just above Bowling last evening, when upward bound, as previously reported, and may have to lighten before she can be floated.

The Anchor liner Furnessia, Capt. Harris, from New York, also for here, and reported aground, was attempting to pass the Scandinavian and fouled her. Both steamers are reported to be damaged. Several other steamers are reported to be aground or fog-bound near by.

CABLE NOTES.
 Penny postage between the colonies and Great Britain will go into effect on Christmas Day. India is to be included.

The Baroness Hirsch, though she has never resided in London, and has no knowledge of those whom she is helping, has donated \$250,000 for the establishment of a Jewish convalescent home in Hampstead, London, which will have accommodation for 36 patients.

LADY CURZON TO DAZZLE INDIA.
 Lady Curzon, of Kedleston, is getting such an array of costumes for the Indian viceroyalty as has never been seen in the Indian court before. She has just returned from a week in Paris, where the whole time was devoted to frocks.

She stayed at the Hotel de France et de Choiseul, and had a special reception-room, where for several hours daily she saw a succession of the most famous Parisian costume designers. The orders to Worth alone are said to reach \$15,000.

FRENCH NAVAL PREPARATION

The Echo De Paris' Story Denied and Reaffirmed.

Major Marchand's Arrangements for Evacuating Fashoda—Coquetting With Menelik.

Paris, Nov. 10.—M. Lockroy, minister of marine, denies that there is any truth in the rumors published by the Echo de Paris. But despite M. Lockroy's denial, there is little doubt that the news of French naval preparations is in the main correct. Admiral Fourrier has arrived, in response to M. Lockroy's summons, and the two have already held a long conference with several admirals at the ministry of marine.

It is believed that M. Lockroy intends a set-off to the British demonstrations at Portsmouth, and it is rumored that he will increase the French fleet at the cost of a milliard francs, which will be obtained by a conversion of rentes into 2 1/2 per cents. The admirals, it is understood, have reported all the coast defenses in a complete state of readiness. At Algiers there is the greatest activity. All the forts have been fully manned, and the defenses improved. Admiral Gervais has fallen ill from overwork in connection with the preparations.

The French newspapers generally approve the silence of the Chamber of Deputies on the subject of Fashoda, and congratulate M. Brunot on his withdrawal of the interpellation which he intended to address to the government on the subject. The Siecle says it regrets that Major Marchand did not observe the same reticence at Cairo.

EVACUATION OF FASHODA.
 Cairo, Nov. 10.—Major Marchand and Capt. Barthelemy start for Fashoda on Thursday or Friday to carry out the evacuation of that place by the French garrison, which will retire by way of Abyssinia to Jibuti, a six months' journey.

The Rome correspondent of the London Daily Mail says: It is asserted positively that Major Marchand has established communication with Emperor Menelik of Abyssinia, and that France is now intriguing with that monarch.

MORE PREPARATIONS.
 Paris, Nov. 10.—The Matin says that at a council of the admirals held yesterday it was decided to fit out all the French war vessels available, and 30 reserve ships have been ordered into commission.

SALISBURY SUITS THEM.
 The newspapers of this city, notably the Gleaner and the Figaro, express satisfaction at the Marquis of Salisbury's speech, delivered at the Guildhall banquet last night, which they consider as tending towards a peaceful solution of a misunderstanding and as replacing the Fashoda question on its proper ground.

THE PEACE CONFERENCE IN PARIS.
 Paris, Nov. 10.—The newspapers of this city, after yesterday's meeting of the peace commissions, seemed to have gathered from some source or another the impression that the Spanish commissioners have cause for complaint against the Americans because the latter presented their replies to the Spanish proposals in English, and without a Spanish translation of the document. There is no basis for complaint upon the subject. The president of the Spanish commission, Senor Montero Rios, and Judge Day, the president of the American commission, agreed that owing to the length of the document, all concerned might be spared the reading of matter, which is usually translated into Spanish for the benefit of Senor Montero Rios and two other members of the Spanish commission, who do not understand English. Each side, up to the present, has made its own written translations, but the Americans alone have supplied an interpreter for the joint sessions, the Spaniards relying on the American interpreter instead of furnishing an interpreter for their side, as they might have expected to do. The American interpreter is Mr. Arthur Ferguson, and the Spaniards have marveled at the facility with which he did his work. They have never once checked him or corrected him in the slightest degree. In view of the facts in the case, the references of the Paris newspapers this morning are interesting.
