WESTERN ONTARIO

Quebec's coal shortage is so acute that only three days' supply is left, and Mayor Mahoney is taking up the question of immediate relief with the railway commission.

The expected resignations and withdrawals did not materialize in St. Thomas, and an election is now sure.

John Knapp and his assistant, Oscar Knapp, of the Colchester Reef Light-house were brought back by a daring trip of Lewis Goodchild and Otto Dewey. The lighthouse men had only supplies for two days more.

Some 55 miles of Pere Marquette rails may be taken over to France for use on the British light railway lines there.

Last week's tobacco sales at Blenheim realized \$20,000. Some of the farmers got as much as \$800 per acre for their leaf.

Employment to 150 men will be given by the Huntsville Manufacturing Company of New York State, which is starting a Canadian branch in the old Electric Car Works at Tillsonburg.

Acting Chief of Police Samuel Bickley of Woodstock has resigned after evidence heard against the chief and Constable Moore for being drunk on duty. Market Clerk Duncan Stewart preferred the charges. Moore was honorably acquitted.

Strathroy women yesterday gave a dinner to 40 inmates of the county house of refuge there.

CANADIAN

Grand Trunk traffic earnings from December 15 to 21, 1916, were \$1,164,962. In 1915 they were \$1,040,659, an increase of \$124,303.

General Sir Sam Hughes has accepted an invitation to address the Canadian Club of New York City on January 6. He will speak on preparedness.

Sachio Cormier, aged 6, of Regina, is dead, his mother is not expected to live and a younger brother was seriously burned as the result of pouring coal oil on the kitchen fire.

Reports from Niagara Falls say that many interested men have escaped across the border. These men were brought from the internment camps to work on the Welland Canal. A suspicion that the men have been taking money over the line to send to Austria.

Hon. A. L. Sifton, premier of Alberta, has announced that the provincial legislature will meet on Tuesday, February 6. This will be the fifth session of the third legislature. No official information as to the legislation to be brought down is as yet available, but it is known that a rural credits bill will be one of the principal measures to be considered.

AMERICAN

Celia Schmitter, 22 years of age, was shot dead in Buffalo yesterday by a man believed to be Maurice Gold, 45 years old, of Philadelphia, who afterwards committed suicide by shooting himself. Miss Schmitter came to Buffalo four weeks ago from Philadelphia and was to have married on Saturday night a Buffalo man.

Official confirmation of the occupation of Torreon by Villa forces was made by the Carranza consul at Paso, Texas. Carranza was evacuated by Gen. Talamante and his command of 1,600 defecting troops, the consul said, because of a superior opposing force. He denied rumors that Gen. Francisco Murguía, commander at Chihuahua City, had an understanding with Villa, and had made no effort to oppose Villa's recent capture of Chihuahua City.

Charles Richard Tjader, explorer, author and inventor, died in New York Wednesday, after a brief illness. Mr. Tjader, in 1906, led an expedition into the East African jungle for the American Museum of Natural History. He discovered two new species of anteaters, which have been named after him. Among his writings is a book on "The Big Game of Africa." He was born in April, 1869, in Karlskrona, Sweden.

Several hundred shots were fired across the Rio Grande into Mexico last night when a detachment of the Kentucky National Guard, on border duty, was fired on. The officers reported a fusillade of several hundred shots.

The toll of the Arkansas tornado was officially put at 12 killed and 23 injured yesterday.

Because Carranza has not replied to the American demands to ratify or reject the protocol signed by the American-Lexican commission, Secretary of State Lansing has commenced the closing of negotiations.

Washington has been given copies of alleged letters found in the home of Gen. Koralak, recruiting chief of the Venizelos army, in which Venizelos is said to have called for extreme measures to bring Greece into the war on the side of the Entente.

Frank Robertson, famous travelogue lecturer, who has toured Canada and the States for years, died yesterday at Denver, Colorado, from appendicitis.

Argument on a motion for a new trial for John Edward Tepler, convicted at Buffalo of the murder of his mother, Mrs. Agnes M. Tepler, has been postponed until next Wednesday. The delay was requested by Edward R. O'Malley, Tepler's counsel, who asked for further time to prepare his case. The argument for a re-trial will be based on the ground that the verdict of guilty of second degree murder was illogical and against the weight of evidence.

GENERAL

The annual report issued in the German Chamber of Commerce states that during 1916 "close co-operation of the Government and people made practically available all the means which guarantee the possibility of an energetic continuation of the war and of the provisioning of the population with all the necessities of life. On this fact can be based a certainty that our economic evolution in the future also will be equal to the emergencies of war time."

ANGLO-FRENCH STAND
ARRIVED AT
TO GERMAN PROPOSALS

Russia's Answer, Too, Has Been Received by France, and Joint Response Expected This Week.

LONDON, Dec. 27.—England and France have fully agreed upon the terms of the reply to be made to the peace proposals of the Teutonic allies, the Associated Press learned at the foreign office today. It is hoped here that the answer may be dispatched by the end of this week, but other nations of the Entente, although agreed in principle, may require verbal alterations, which would necessitate further delay.

It is expected that once this reply has been forwarded, the response to President Wilson's note will follow shortly.

FRANCE HAS RUSSIA'S REPLY. Russia's reply to the German peace proposals was telegraphed Monday to the French Government, says a Reuter dispatch from Petrograd. It adds that the Swiss minister has handed to the Russian foreign minister the note of the Swiss Government supporting President Wilson's note.

Germany Has Sent Her Terms
to Neutrals, Says Report

WASHINGTON, Dec. 27.—Reports repeated in press dispatches from Rome that Germany had presented to the neutral nations, whose attitudes and actions in forwarding peace suggestions, sealed packets containing terms, were the subject of much comment in diplomatic circles.

The Rome report had it that the packets were not to be opened and forwarded to Germany's enemies unless they, in reply to the notes of the central powers of December 12, specifically requested terms. In German circles here it was considered more probable that direct communication would be conveyed personally to President Wilson through Ambassador Gerard.

Deposited Arrivals, totalling 50,000, are reported starting at Aleppo, Asiatic Turkey, as the result of suspension of relief appropriations.

French imports and exports are growing steadily. November's record was 727,000 francs for exports, and 2,111,000,000 francs for imports.

Germany has sent another guarantee of Swiss neutrality as a result of the fears entertained that Germany was preparing to break through the republic to reach France and Italy.

One of the thickest fogs in years enveloped old London yesterday, disorganizing traffic and causing great inconvenience.

Great Britain has contracted for the entire exportable meat supply from New Zealand.

The destruction of the Swiss village of Champéry, a tourist resort in the Canton of Valais, is threatened by the advance of a number of avalanches coupled with a landslide. Several houses have been crushed, and the whole population has been evacuated. Swiss troops and 200 interned French prisoners of war are working day and night to preserve the rest of the village. An enormous avalanche has swept away many Alpine huts near Simpat Pass, killing two men and many cattle.

A Stockholm dispatch says that bread and flour tickets will be issued in Sweden from January 15.

A Vienna dispatch says that Privy Councillor Rudolf Seibert, governor of the Austrian Land Credit Bank, has resigned at the request of Emperor Charles. He is succeeded by Ritter von Leth.

The International Agricultural Institute reports poor potato crops in the northern hemisphere. Its provisional estimates are 201,000,000 quintals for the world's crops, including the United States, Canada, Switzerland, the Netherlands, Italy and Japan, and also England, Ireland and Scotland, where the crops are the lowest on record. The figures for Germany and Austria-Hungary are not available.

The appointment of the Bank of England as agent for the Federal Reserve Bank of New York is interpreted by the financial expert of the London Times as a formal authorization for American banks to negotiate for the establishment of their own agencies in London. The Times believes the arrangement has various advantages for British finance, both during and after the war.

PEACE

The London Daily Chronicle, in an editorial on Germany's reply to Wilson's peace note, says: "The point on which the world is divided is not the German reply, but the attitude of the Entente. The German reply is entirely ignored in the German reply. . . . For all its studied politeness, there is implied therein the rejection in advance of any offer of mediation by America."

THE WAR

"In the Adige Valley," says yesterday's Italian war office statement, "our artillery kept the enemy's lines under a vigorous fire and disturbed his working parties. On the rest of the front the completion of our field works was interrupted at several points by skirmishes with the enemy's advanced posts."

Lloyd's shipping agency announces that the Danish bark Josan has been sunk.

German official statements yesterday claimed that nine airplanes were lost in the one day by the Entente.

Berlin reports the capture of Rimnik Sarai, an important town to the northeast of Buzau in Great Wallachia. The Russian official statement says that the Allied forces were pushed back slightly here after fierce attacks by the Germans.

Lloyd's Shipping Agency announces that the Swedish steamer Priga is believed to have been sunk.

JUDGMENT RESERVED.—Judgment was reserved for one week in the case of four local businessmen, each charged in police court under the war revenue act with alleged failure to attach the necessary war stamps to certain articles that were taxable under the act. Owing to a number of technicalities raised by counsel for the defence, the presiding magistrate, Henry Macdonald, J. P., and J. J. Dyer, concluded to consult advocates before giving judgment.

ENTENTE'S PREMIERS
BEFORE CONFERENCE

Count Von Reventlow Has Novel Ideas on Peace.

EXCLUDE ALL NEUTRALS

This Possibility Finds Favor With Anti-American Papers of Germany.

Berlin, Dec. 27, via London, Dec. 28.—Germany's answer to President Wilson, and the promptness with which it was made, have caused a good impression generally in the press. Only the anti-American newspapers show a tendency to dissent, and express the view that interference of any kind by America is intolerable. The latter papers find it difficult to understand the participation of neutrals in the conference.

Count von Reventlow, while avoiding a direct attack on the German answer, assumes that no German delegate will find willing to take a seat at the same table with English and French delegates. He answered with the same Premier Lloyd George and Briand, or until those speeches are apologized for. The Tagesspiegel concludes that the note emphatically rejects the participation of neutrals in a peace conference.

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Financial, Market and Commercial Section

THE LOCAL MARKET

Unless a great deal of produce is brought in Friday and Saturday, this will be one of the smallest market weeks during 1916. There was the usual lull after Christmas Day and on Wednesday the condition of the roads prevented farmers from coming in. Hay, particularly, was scarce today because of this. The price was steady at \$12 to \$14 a ton. There was a fair demand for straw at \$6.50 to \$10 a cwt. Grain was not very plentiful. Oats sold for \$2 a bushel, new wheat for \$1.50 a bushel, and old wheat for \$1.80 to \$1.40 a bushel.

The vegetable supply is expected to be little larger Friday and Saturday. Potatoes are selling for \$2.10 to \$2.25 a bag. Dry onions sell for \$2.25 to \$2.50 a bushel. Parsnips sell for \$1 to \$1.25 a bushel and turnips for 50c to 60c.

Apples are scarce only fruit offered. They sell for 90c to \$1.25 a bushel. There is not much increase in the supply of dairy produce. Owing to the security of feed, stock is not being fed so much as usual. Cream is plentiful, resulting in a scarcity of cream and milk. Creamery butter is selling for 47c to 48c a pound, retail. Dairy butter, in rolls, brings 46c to 47c a pound. Eggs are selling for 30c to 32c a dozen.

Poultry is fairly plentiful, in expectation of a good demand for New Year's Day. Chickens, geese and ducks are most in demand, few turkeys being available. Eggs are slightly rising at 29c a pound, retail.

Dressed hogs are firmer at \$15.25 a cwt. The big interests were in the wheat market. The cash market was dull. Cash traders have begun to calculate their losses on the basis of the new price. They were sought on this basis, but the general demand was poor. Oats, barley and flax were also poor.
