CHURCH MUST LEAD IN RECONSTRUCTION WHEN WAR IS OVER

Rev. Dr. Sedgewick Discusses Situation Before Presbytery.

Arrangements Being Made for Greatly Extending Evangelical Work.

NATION-WIDE CAMPAIGN

That the church, as the agency of the kingdom of God, has much to do in the reconstruction period after the war, was the substance of an address delivered Thursday before the members of the London Presbytery at their fall meeting in the First Presbyterian Church, by the Rev. Dr. Sedgewick of Hamilton. Speaking on the general assembly's commission on the war, and the spiritual life of the church, Dr. Sedgewick also referred to the arangements being made at the present ime by the evangelical churches for a nation-wide campaign of evangelism, which in view of the possible ending of the war was to be undertaken as soon as possible.

All stipends are to be \$1,200, with house and the usual vacation, according to the report of the committee in charge of the matter, presented to the meeting by Rev. W. A. Bremner. The committee will visit all the congregations in the presbytery, in order that the action of the general assembly may pe carried out.

The resignation of Rev. Dr. McCrae, pastor of the Hamilton Road Church, was received and will be dealt with at the November meeting. The general assembly has granted Dr. McCrae leave to retire from the active duties of the ministry, and he purposes retiring towards the end of the year.
