TO SAVE THE PREMIER'S SEAT?

THE tacit admission of the Toronto Globe that Sir Robert Borden may not be able to win his own Halifax seat is followed by a special order-in-council whereby troops at the port of Halifax may be voted in the strangest manner ever heard of in Canada.

Under the terms of the order-in-council the polls may also be held:

- (1) With or without notice to any authority, officer, or person mentioned in the military voters' act, and in the presence or absence of any such authority.
- (2) Whether or not any authority, officer, or person concerned in the administration of the military voters' act, or in the conduct of, or having charge of, any such polls has been properly or at all appointed or sworn as required by the military voters' act.
- (3) With or without notice, posting, placarding, or advertising of any matter or information required by the military voters' act.
- (4) Whether or not the authorities, officers, or persons administering the military voters' act or conducting such polls shall have received, held, or disposed of the ballots, envelopes, or other election supplies or materials in the manner provided in the military voters' act, or shall have strictly adhered to, or required strict adherence to, or suffered, or permitted other than strict adherence to the manner of voting required by the military voters' act that which they shall have in such administration and conduct done, suffered, or permitted with respect to the manner of voting as aforesaid being confirmed and the same being deemed valid to all intents and purposes.

Can the puritanical Toronto Globe, in the name of saving the seat of Sir Robert Borden, give indorsement to the Government's latest order to herd soldiers from all over Canada at Halifax and vote them like cattle, on street corners, up alleys, up back stairways, anywhere, any time, any how, by impromptu deputy returning officers, without scrutineers present, without even a ballot box in sight, without the assurance that it will be the soldiers' ballots as a final record? "Herd the soldier vote" in England and in Canada may have results that will be calculated to work for the election of Sir Robert Borden, but if he is to win power by such means, then God help Canada!

SOLDIERS VOTE LAURIER.

TERROR has seized the Borden Government and its supporters. The Canadian soldiers overseas, on whom it had counted to vote blindly for the self-styled patriotic party, are showing intelligence and moral strength which the Government had not anticipated, and are expressing their disapproval of the years of muddling, inefficiency, hoodlumbing and hypocrisy which it will do most good—on their ballots. They are showing "very strong resentment" against Sir Robert and his friends.

This attitude of the fighting force was to be expected; its members have experienced the playing of politics in the camps in England and in the trenches in France. They have madly jerked at and worked with their Ross rifles when the foe was charging, only to find them jammed and useless. They have seen their comrades fall victims to German bullets because Borden politics had decreed they should not have reliable weapons. They have gone into sodden trenches with good-looking boots to find that water went through them as easily as if they had been paper, and have limped back to the base, casualties because of the grafting. But the Borden Government, in its gross ignorance, believed all these abuses would be forgotten when the flag was waved before the eyes of the warriors.

What proof is there that the soldiers are taking this attitude? The best in the world. Private advices from trustworthy sources not to the Liberal press but to those editors who have espoused the Borden cause. Leading among these is G. F. Pearson of the Halifax Chronicle. Here is the telegram he sends to Joseph E. Atkinson, owner of the Toronto Daily Star, one of the most enthusiastic "Unionists," and a member with Willison of the Union publicity committee:

J. E. Atkinson, The Star, Toronto:
HALIFAX, Dec. 2.—Trustworthy advices received here from overseas indicate VERY STRONG RESENTMENT AMONG THE SOLDIERS AT THE TREATMENT WHICH THEY HAVE EXPERIENCED FROM PERLEY AND THE HEADQUARTERS STAFF.

This feeling, coupled with war weariness, is LIKELY TO RESULT IN THEIR VOTING VERY STRONGLY AGAINST UNION GOVERNMENT. BORDEN BEING VERY GENERALLY CONDEMNED.

What do you think of the idea of Liberal newspapers supporting the principles of union government, joining in a cable message to overseas forces to the effect that our attitude had been dictated by our desire to

back up the boys at the front, and that we believe, if returned to power, the Union Government will become an effective instrument TO REMEDY THE INTOLERABLE CONDITIONS WHICH HAVE SO FAR OBTAINED. Message to be published prominently in all the British papers. If you agree, will you take the matter up with Ontario papers? Am wiring Daffoe (editor of the Winnipeg Press Press). Please advise, if possible, what you think.

Mr. Pearson makes no attempt, when corresponding with political bedfellows, to hide the truth. Conditions have been and are intolerable. For these the Borden Government is wholly responsible. In spite of this he would persuade the boys, if he could, to make no change at Ottawa, but leave Borden free to continue such conditions. He forgets that camouflage is familiar to all in France, and they are trained to look through it.

This, then, is the fact: Canadian soldiers are voting strongly against the Borden Government. But is that what "Unionist"-inspired dispatches from Europe say? Oh, no. They announce that 95 per cent of the men are supporting Borden, and these untruths are being published and given prominence by these editors who know the truth and discuss it among themselves. Are they leaders in whom the people may trust for honest guidance of opinion and presentation of facts? They are wilfully misleading their readers for Borden party purposes. Their reason for so doing must be determined by the people, who will not find it difficult. Their unfaithfulness to duty is proven by their own words and acts.

Is there any doubt as to the object of publishing news dispatches which set forth false statements about the way soldiers are voting overseas? It is to influence the vote of the wives, the mothers, the sisters and daughters who remain in Canada, and who are not certain how their soldier-relatives would have them mark the ballot. It is to mislead them into forsaking their protectors and voting against them. It is to induce those soldiers still in Canada to follow the alleged example of their comrades and support the Borden Government, whereas by falling into the trap they would be voting against these comrades.

Men who have gone over the top in France and Belgium have found the realities of life. All they hold dearest now are honor, integrity, faithfulness to trust and the principles of true democracy. It is for these they fight; it is for these they vote. They support Sir Wilfrid Laurier. Can the people at home do less?

LIKE TO LIKE.

LIKE draws to like. Both the Lord and the devil know their own. Mates instinctively and quickly find one another.
