

All the speakers said that while the celebration was a little hasty, yet it was only a matter of days or hours perhaps before official word would come. The celebration is still being kept up, and excitement still in the air, and the people remaining congested here hoping for word to come.

In Detroit the occasion was observed even more strenuously, and for a time in the early evening traffic in the downtown streets was impossible. Several biplanes from Selfridge flying field hovered over the downtown section of the city, while from Dayton, Ohio, came a huge dirigible, carrying half a dozen soldiers.
