





Hon. James Duff, minister of agriulture, could not be present to open the afternoon proceedings, and the meeting at once began the consideration of the spraying problem. J. C. Smith of Burlington told how he had conquered the codlin moth by one application of spray just as the blossoms iell. He tested his orchards with the spray mixtures, and found that success is largely due to personal inspec-tion and selection of the spray materials. He would use arsenite of lead and would spray four or five times.

D. Johnson of Forest claimed there was no danger of using too much spray mixture. Said J. E. Johnston of Simcoe: Spray the first time for fungus, second time for bud moth, third time for codlin moth, fourth time for tussock moth,

this last pest being a new one to orchardists. Mr. Johnston's formula, which he obtained from New York, consists as follows: To 250 gallons of water 1 lb. white arsenic, 3 lbs. sal soda, 1 lb. Paris green, 20 lbs. bluestone and 70 lbs. stone lime. Prepare the arsenic and sal soda by boiling together for 45

minutes. The apple maggot and blister lice was the subject of an address by Prof. Lockhead of St. Anne's, and the concluding article of the afternoon session was on the "Handling of the Strawberry," by S. H. Rittenhouse of Jordan Harbor, and the discussion was led by A. E. Herrington of Walkerton.
In the evening Prof. Harcourt spoke on German orchard fertilizers, and Prof. M. B. Waite, pathologist of the U. S. department of agriculture, on "Prevalent Fungus Diseases of Ontario Or-chards," "Vine and Twig Blight" and "Peach Yellows."
