

City Engineer Rust Makes Estimate for City Council-

The cost of extending Bloorstreet east to Danforth-road by means of a viaduct will be \$619,000, excluommittee yesterday.

Ald. Foster, upon whose motion the estimate was made, may move to have a bylaw for the building of the viaduct submitted to the ratepayers on Jan. 1, after the assessment department has reported upon the amount of land damages involved.

While the expenditure called for is 2

substantial one, it is small in compar son with other public works undertaken within the past two or three years, and the benefits that would result from the viaduct are self-evident. It would mean that Danforth-avenue and Bloorstreet would provide a straight thorofare from the east to the west limits of Greater Toronto. Great as would be the gain to Riverdale, there is nothing like sectionalism in the project, since convenient access to the rapidly grow-ing portion of the city, east of the Don has become a public necessity. That situation is shown by the fact that wo of the strongest advocates of the viaduct are Aid. Adams and J. J. Gra-

nam, of the sixth ward. Mr. Rust's report reads:
"The total length of the proposed extension is approximately 4934 feet. The extension would involve the con-struction of two viaducts, one 1450 feet long, crossing the River Don at a max-imum height of 120 feet at the river crossing, and another crossing the first His Bo'sun Was Given an Eva
