### WILL ASK THE STREET RY. FOR BETTER CAR SERVICE

Mayor McLaren is Authorized by Council to Interview the Management—Fish and Game Officers.

HAMILTON, Dec. 12.—(Special.)—At the meeting of the city council this evening Alderman Morris mentioned the poor accommodation given by the street railway, especially in the east end, at the noon hour, and in the evenings. Mayor McLaren will interview the company to see if a better service cannot be obtained at these times, and also on Sunday at church hours. O. S. Hillman and Walter Anderson were reappointed city auditors at \$400 a year each. Clerk, who is in the plumbing business, found fault because the House of Refuge committee had not advertised for tenders for tenders for plumbing and was informed that estimates and proved so high that the work had been called off. Word has been received of the death of William Henry Kim, a former Hamilton man, who was killed in the explosion of powder mills at Glen Wilbur, Ohio.

**Contracting Co. to Be Dissolved.**  
WINNIPEG, Dec. 13.—(Special.)—The contracting firm of Kelly and Kelly, who have several branches in the west, was ordered dissolved to-day as a climax of a lengthy litigation. A receiver will be appointed.

### TRAIN WRECKS A WAGON BOY KILLED, ANOTHER HURT

Farmer and Two Other Lads Escaped Uninjured—Yesterday's Level Crossing Tragedy.

PORT COLBORNE, Dec. 12.—George Daybold, a farmer, residing in Watford Township, was driving his four sons to school this morning when the rig was struck by a G.T.R. freight train at a crossing five miles west of here.

One boy, Joseph, aged 8, was instantly killed, and Alonzo, aged 10, was seriously injured.

Daybold received only slight injuries, and the other boys escaped without a scratch.

The horse was killed and the wagon completely demolished.

The horse became unmanageable while being driven across the track.

### BELT LINE CAR CHANGES AROUSE CITY COUNCIL

City Engineer Says, However, That Railway as Usual Have Whip-Hand.

"While Robert John says he is doing all he can to accommodate the public, he is doing the very reverse," asserted Ald. McMurich. "It's abominable," concurred the mayor.

These expressions of opinion were given at yesterday's meeting of the city council, having reference to the withdrawal of a number of belt line cars on Sunday under orders of Manager Fleming.

Ald. McMurich's Motion. Ald. McMurich, with Ald. Vaughan as seconder, submitted a motion which called upon the city engineer and city solicitor to report upon whether the city's agreement with the company offers any protection.

The motion reads: "That whereas the Toronto Railway Company have seen fit to change very much the service on the belt line on Sundays, greatly to the inconvenience of the ratepayers who patronize that line on that day, be it resolved that the city engineer be called upon to report to this council what action the city can take under the railway agreement to compel the railway company to provide the necessary accommodation as called for under the agreement, and that he consult with the solicitor's department in reference thereto."

Ald. McMurich declared that passengers in belt line cars on Sundays were packed like herrings in a box as a result of the large cars being taken off, and council unanimously approved the report.

**City is Powerless.**  
The city engineer holds out little hope, however. He says that when the belt line changes were made, he and City Solicitor Johnstone talked over and agreed that, under the decisions of the courts and the Ontario Railway Board, the city was absolutely powerless.

Will Wider St. Clair Avenue. The principle of widening St. Clair-avenue from Yonge-street to Bathurst-street to a width of 100 feet at a cost of \$170,000, was unanimously approved, and the city engineer and board of education instructed to recommend the improvement in the necessary formal bylaw.

There will be joy among the teamsters of Toronto, since council, on motion of Ald. Maguire, voted to rescind the bylaw which compels slow moving vehicles to keep close to the curb.

Spent \$3,600 on Jaunts. It has cost the city \$3602.53 this year for out of town trips by members of council and city officials, not including the bond selling trip to Britain of the mayor and Treasurer Coady, which meant an outlay of about \$1200. As last year's expenses were \$777, comparative economy has been practiced.

Ald. Foster, who asked for the report, seemed satisfied.

**\$30,000 for Schools.**  
The board of education got the \$30,000 it asked. Early in the year the board of control cut that amount off the school board estimates, and yesterday F. E. Rodgins, M.C., and board of education solicitor, notified the council that if the sum were not forthcoming, the school board would have to do without their salaries for the next two weeks. Rather than bring sadness to the schoolmama's at the handsome Yuletide, the \$30,000 was voted.

Ald. Welch wants St. Andrew's market converted into a playground. In a report on the subject of the property commissioner and park commissioner, the latter pointed out that the courts have given the city power to do as it likes with the property, which was originally dedicated for market uses.

**The Ward Lease.**  
The article of William Ward, one of the city's most prominent real estate men, appeared in the "Toronto Star" yesterday. After much litigation, a court of arbitration decided that Mr. Ward, who had been paying \$5 a year rental of city property on Ward's Island, occupied by him, should pay \$200 a year, which was a considerable increase.

The article also mentioned that the city had sent a manifesto to Premier Ashcroft that his offer to submit to the next parliament an equal rights bill was wholly unsatisfactory owing to the fact that the Liberals had given this same promise at the last election and had repudiated it.

**British Postal Department in Arrangement With W. U. Tel. Co.**  
LONDON, Dec. 13.—The British postal department announced that it has concluded a money transfer agreement with the Western Union Telegraph Company, under which that company will be permitted to make cable transfers of money between its offices in the United States and points in Great Britain and Ireland, where the orders will be cashed through the postal department.

The arrangement has the sanction of the British treasury, and will become operative on Jan. 1 next.

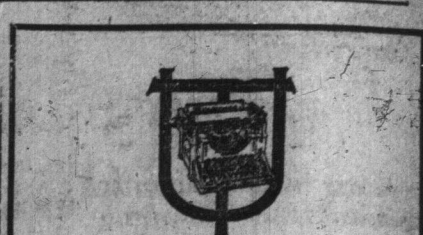
