Hamilton's Soldier Athletes Compete in Great Military Fete on Victoria Day.

POLICEMAN ENLISTS

Twenty-Seventh Member of City's Police Force Joins Overseas Battalion.

HAMILTON, May 24.—Soldier athletes from all the battalions in the city of Hamilton and the County of Wentworth unit competed in the greatest sporting gathering ever held in Dundas yesterday.

Another member of the local police force, in the person of Constable Kay, has discarded the suit of blue serge of khaki, and will become a member of the 26th. This makes a total of 27 members of the police force who have enlisted for active service.
