CANADA PASSES OBJECTIVE IN LOAN

She has until 12 o'clock Saturday night to secure 20,000 subscriptions for a total of \$12,000,000. Can it be done? The central executive says so. J. Fleming's extension committee earnestly hopes so.

Carry Heavy Load. Toronto's total on Thursday night was \$38,000,000, with 94,000 subscriptions. The number of subscribers now is 101,000. These figures indicate the manner in which Toronto is coming forward and they also indicate the heavy load that is being carried by the four thousand workers who are pushing forward the final drive for the \$75,000,000 objective.

John W. Mitchell, chairman of the central executive, issued a special appeal last night to all holders of bonds to turn canvasser on Saturday and get somebody else to buy a bond.

Every bondholder is a canvasser on Saturday, and I ask each person who has bought a bond to get somebody else to take one. In that way we will surely reach our objective," said Mr. Mitchell.

Arrange Grand Finale. The battle from now till 12 o'clock tonight is one of figures, and there will be few stunts to help the public decide the question. If after the display put on by the publicity committee there is anyone who does not understand that the country is at war and that the government is offering bonds for sale, then there is nothing short of blowing up one or two skyscrapers left for the publicity committee to do.

Monday night will be the scene of a grand finale at the main armories, when a special performance will be put on and the final figures announced. A Masonic chorus of 200 voices will provide the program, and the public will be welcomed.

HOSPITAL PARK SITE QUESTION COMPLICATED

Special Committee Goes to Military Headquarters and Displeases Mayor Church.

Major-General S. C. Mewburn's arrival in Toronto yesterday had the effect of still further adding to the complexity of the situation arising out of the proposal to have a military hospital in High Park. The special committee appointed for the purpose of searching out an alternative site went instead to Toronto military headquarters to confer with General Mewburn and General Logie. Mayor Church happened to arrive on the scene and was much displeased when he saw what had happened, also when he heard that there was talk of giving over the whole of High Park to the military and closing it to the public. The mayor said the committee had exceeded its powers. The whole matter of the hospital site will come up before the city council on Monday. General Mewburn says a park land site for the new hospital must be had at once or the hospital will go somewhere else.

FIRE ENQUIRY ADJOURNS

Investigation Into Aberdeen Chambers Blaze Not Yet Finished—More Evidence to Come.

At the third sitting of the investigation into the Aberdeen Chambers fire, held before Fire Marshal E. P. Heaton last night, several new witnesses were heard.—E. Schofield, who was called on Tuesday night, cleared up a few points of which he was in doubt at his last appearance.

"Presumably you were the last person to leave the building on the night of the fire," said Lieut.-Col. Greer after he had questioned Schofield. "Yes," Schofield answered.

Frank Schofield was called and practically corroborated his brother's story.

Wm. Small, the policeman on duty in the district of the Aberdeen Chambers at the time of the fire, gave evidence to the effect that he had seen a man at the corner of Adelaide and Victoria streets about 3 o'clock in the morning, but as he did nothing to arouse Small's suspicions the policeman paid no more attention to him, and it was not until after the fire that he recalled the incident.

Miss Barbara Scott, T. W. Hathway's bookkeeper, was called to settle some questions in regard to her employer's business.

The enquiry was adjourned till Thursday, Dec. 6.

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
