THE MAGNITUDE OF THE BRIT-ISH EMPIRE.

The London Daily Mail signalized Empire Day by publishing a great quantity of data throwing light on the magnitude of the British Empire.

The area of the Empire is now 13,-000,000 square miles, or more than a fifth of the whole area of land on the the standpat attitude on the tariff. The total population in 1908 is over 400,000,000, or between onefourth and one-fifth the total population of the earth. Of this vast population only a fraction is white, the total number of white inhabitants not exceeding 58,350,000 in the current year. In other words, the empire has six colored inhabitants for every white one. It is not generally known that between 1860 and 1907 the area of the empire increased from 5,850,000 square miles to. 11,445,000. During the same period-less than half a century-the revenue has increased two and a half times, and the volume of trade has been more than trebled.

We note, says the New York Sun, in commenting on the Mail's statistics, that the annual cost of all the defensive forces of the empire is \$455,spent in imperial administration. If we analyze these figures we find that the people of the United Kingdom contributed toward the disbursethe white inhabitants of the empire outside of the British Isles only 12 the Provincial Government. cents. The aggregate war strength of the land forces of the empire in 1908 is officially estimated at slightly over 1,-000.000.

If now we turn to commercial statistics we find that the total value of another victory in England. In 1906 it consisted of 10,340,000 tons of steam vessels and 2,450,000 tons of sailing vessels. To this aggregate Canada contributed 661,000 tons and Australia's share was 368,000 tons.

The total revenues of the empire now amount to \$1,400,000,000 annually. while the aggregate debt exceeds \$7,-500,000,000. Of the self-governing states of the empire Canada is the least taxed and the least indebted, whereas taxation and debt are highest in New Zealand.
