Honored France And Aided Her Wounded Heros

Red Cross Entertainments in Imperial and Empress Theatres Prove Brilliantly Successful

The anniversary of the fall of the Bastille which marked the birth of modern France, was observed in St. John yesterday, two days in advance of the date, owing to the difficulties connected with having the observation on a Saturday. The local Red Cross Society led in the arrangements and the public recognition of the day took the form of entertainments in the Imperial and Empress theatres, the proceeds of which are to be devoted to the sick and wounded French soldiers.

At the Imperial the shows took the place of the regular performances. The stage was appropriately decorated, for which much credit is due the theatre management. The programme of motion pictures was superb and those familiar with the business state that it was the best show devoted entirely to one subject ever produced in St. John. The film companies were most generous. The Universal Film Company and the General Film Company and Pathe Freres were the contributors. Late features were brought in, too. When the Pathe Freres office at Montreal heard of the affair a special film was shipped gratis and arrived in time. The reel consisted of a series of views showing the Canadians, including the 26th, at the front. The sergeant explained the pictures in detail, making an interesting lecture which evoked no little applause. Pictures of Miss Margaret Hare, R.R.S. and Nursing Sister Warren, local nurses who have distinguished themselves, were thrown on the screen and loud applause. The French national anthem was beautifully sung by Madam Furlong Schmidt during which the whole audience stood. She was encored repeatedly and returned to the stage bearing the tri-color. Tremendous applause greeted her and the audience stood again and joined enthusiastically in the Marseillaise.

The programme of pictures included a strong war piece, The Bugler of Algiers. The French army and navy were screened and views of charming France.

Committee in Charge.

The entire entertainment was under the direction of Mrs. Harold Lawrence, Mrs. P. S. White, Miss Ethel Rising and Mrs. Heber Vroom, assisted by members of the Y. W. P. A. who acted as ushers. Candy, donated by Valcartier and Seven Seas chapters, L. O. D. B., and the W. P. A. was sold quickly and brought splendid returns.

At the Empress, West St. John, the entertainment was conducted under the auspices of the Lancaster Red Cross. It was a brilliant and varied programme and the environments were artistic and tasty. The management of the theatre had the whole auditorium draped with French and Allied flags. The screen bore a large Red Cross and a fleur-de-lis was focused from the camera on the screen, and on the entertainment as they appeared. Miss Kathryn Galloway sang the Marseillaise most effectively, with the tri-color draped about her. The audience stood and applauded until she was obliged to repeat the number. Other soloists were Miss Ermine Climo, A. C. Smith, Miss Val Penton, Miss Gladys Grant and E. C. Gilvan.

The films were loaned to this entertainment by the Universal Film Company and the Specialty Import Company, the feature being The War Wall, a war story emphasizing the splendid work being done by the Red Cross service. Official war films were also shown.

LOCAL NEWS

The Temple Band gave a concert last evening in King Square. Despite the fact that the evening was rather foggy, hundreds of the citizens were out and enjoyed the music.

The movement to keep the public schools closed until after Labor Day has been causing a great deal of interest, especially among those who go to the country for the summer and who have children attending school. Nothing definite has been decided yet, but it is probable that a special meeting of the school board will be called to deal with the question.

GIVES WARNING OF SHARKS.

Reports in American Papers Start Scare Again.

The officials of the United States Weather Bureau at 1 Broadway sent out a warning on Monday to all bathers that one of their correspondents, a trustworthy elderly sea captain, had reported sighting two schools of big gray sharks on June 30 between the Delaware Capes and Cape Hatteras, bound north.

The captain added that he believed

the sharks were feeding on the edge of the Gulf Stream where it goes off to the Rockaway Park. It was stated that while nearly 500 persons, mostly children from St. Monica's Home for Orphans, were bathing in the surf about two o'clock, some one on the beach sighted a shark. It proved to be a species of whale which had been dead about two weeks.

A later report from Rockaway Park stated that another shark scare occurred at 8.45 p. m. off the foot of Tenth Avenue, when some bathers said there were four or five big sharks close to the shore. One of these was reported to have been killed, and was said to measure seven feet and six inches in length.

Keeping Political "Pull" Out of Draft Exemptions

Political influences in the working of the draft exemption boards in the United States is a peril various journals foresee with alarm, and in their support they have no less an authority than the President himself who sounded a note of caution on this point in his proclamation announcing the rules and regulations governing the selection of men for services in the national war-army.

In a Washington despatch to the Socialist New York Call, the charge is made that both Republicans and Democrats were wrangling for places on the exemption boards "in order that one party or the other may have an opportunity to punish their political foes by sending the sons to the trenches."
