PASSING OF THE LIVELY STABLE

(Providence Journal.) The last lively stable in a New England town is about to disappear. A current item says that the proprietor, who has conducted it for many years, will sell out the whole stock soon. "O' my late years there has been much demand for teams and one by one the lively stables of the town have closed."

That has been the common experience elsewhere. The automobile and the trolley car have cut deep into lively profits. Some stables have become garages under the new order of things. Some have simply been shut up and are falling into ruin. There are still some, of course, that continue to do a good business, but they are the exceptions that prove the rule.

Together with the lively stable the old-fashioned blacksmith shop is vanishing. Sometimes it is transformed into a motor-car repair place, but often it nuds up its doors and adds a melancholy feature to the wayside view. Times change and our institutions with them. The Rhode Island countryside shows innumerable shops and mills of an earlier generation which the altered methods of industry have since controlled to close. The lively stables and blacksmith shops merely enforce the familiar lesson that their rusted machinery and broken windows names have taught for years.

SHORT SHIFT FOR THE BOLSHEVIKI

Russian Officials in London Look For Downfall

ACTION BY TROTSKY

Dismisses All Ambassadors And Staffs—Constituent Assembly Called; Kersensky Named as a Delegate

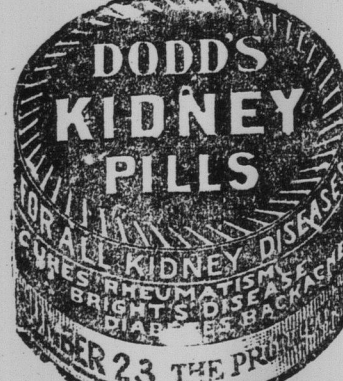
London, Dec. 12—Russian officials in London, who are establishing direct communication with General Kalschinsky and other leaders of democratic organizations in Russia, declared to the Associated Press today that the movement to overthrow the Bolsheviks was supported, not only by the Cossacks, but by almost all the leaders of the other parties. These leaders, it was said, are confident they will be able to make short shrift of the Bolsheviks.

Petrograd, Dec. 11—Leon Trotsky, Bolshevik foreign minister, has issued a decree dismissing all Russian ambassadors and their staffs because they ignored the Bolshevik demand that they denounce the Kersensky government.

Lenine and Moses Uritsky, commissary for elections to the assembly, have issued the following proclamation: "The first meeting of the constituent assembly will be held at the invitation of the commissary for elections to the assembly on the arrival in Petrograd of more than 400 members of the assembly. The meeting will be opened by a person authorized to do so by the council of national commissaries, there being present in the hall of the constituent assembly not fewer than 400 members."

Reports are current that any attempt by the members of the former provisional government to take control of the assembly will be met by arrests. The army of the southwestern front has elected former Premier Kersensky a delegate to the assembly. He also has been chosen by the province of Saratov.

London, Dec. 12—A Reuter despatch from Petrograd dated Monday says the Pravda announces the first collision between the Maximist troops and from 3,000 to 4,000 troops under General Korniloff, armed with machine guns, at Tannanovka station, 28 versts from Belgorod.

make this scheme work there had to be cobblers. Then the cobblers got to raising prices and one's plans for economy were shot full of holes. While shoe-making by hand is a disappearing art, cobbling never before attained such importance as an industry. The difference is that nowadays they cobble with machinery.

Perhaps there is some retributive justice in the present prosperity of the cobbler, for the people have been making the going nightingale for the cobbler's quarters of a century. The trade of shoemaker has been made unprofitable by the introduction of machines, and shoes became so cheap that even the cobbler had little to do.

On one of the voyages of the Mayflower a shoemaker, named Thomas Beard, landed in Boston and began to ply his trade. A little later another establishment was started at Lynn, Mass., and for three centuries the state has led the country in shoe-making. For two centuries the shoemaker was an itinerant workman who converted the farm to farm, where he converted the home-made leather into boots and shoes. When the shoemaker had a shop of his own he had a bench, one end of which was divided into compartments for pegs and things. If one should question one of the grandfathers of the subject, he would speak of the wonderful boots available in the older day. Even within the memory of the present generation there were men who used to have their shoes and boots made by hand local spot for \$18, or maybe it was \$28, for a pair of

boots into which he stuck his trouser legs.

Then came the invention of the machine to compress sole leather, the substitution of wood and metal pegs for stitches, the invention of the sewing machine and a score of other devices which made hand labor unprofitable. The shoe-maker gradually disappeared and his place was taken by a less skilled workman, whose duty was to mend shoes. Now came many years ago while the shoe-making industry grew great. Then it appeared that the shoemaker or his successor, the cobbler, is coming in to his own again—Seattle Post-Intelligencer.

WAR BEER.

(New York World.) With the alcoholic contents of beer reduced by presidential order to 8 per cent, whereas it has run as high as 5 and 6 per cent in some cases, a popular beverage usually classified as intoxicating will become more than ever before a competitor of the rapidly multiplying soft drinks. Some "near-beers" which are highly appreciated by abstemious prohibitionists are weaker by only one-half than what is now to be the standard brew.

Three-per-cent beer will compare with 50-per-cent whiskey, or say 25 per cent, if served as a highball. To a consumer of glass of war beer will be about as exhilarating as a tablespoonful of one of the celebrated bitters and tonics which compounders assure us that the alcohol used is only sufficient to hold the valuable drugs in solution, or as the drink with "government ale."
