Practically every form of outdoor sport is assiduously followed by the British troops in France and Flanders. There seems to be only one solitary exception—viz., golf. But this is because all the courses in the strategic area are either cut by trenches or else serve as sites for field hospitals and base camps.

"Perhaps the simplest sporting fixture to arrange is an athletic programme which includes a large variety of events. So far as possible the management is left to the men, and two or three officers are always on the committee. A prize fund is also put up by the commanding officers, but not actually compelled to do so.

It is only when the locale happens to be a race meeting, gymkhana, or football match, and the like, are likely to include any civilians. Even then the proportion is very small. Everywhere else the spectators are entirely military, and if any ladies grace the assemblage they are certain to belong to the Army Nursing Service. But, for all that, the "gate" is not necessarily British throughout, since it is sure to include a number of French and Belgian officers and men.
