### WILSON BREAKS ALLEY RECORDS

Sets New Marks For Three and Five String Totals on Black's Interesting Ten String Match

Two matches were smashed on Black's alleys on Thursday night by Thomas L. Wilson while he was bowling a ten string match with A. Duffy. He set new marks for both the three and five string records, 215 total for the former was 871, four pins better than the alley record, which he himself made on May 4, 1914. His total for five strings was 379, beating the alley record of 374 which was made by Harry Black, on January 31, 1908. In order to establish the records the strings had to be rolled consecutively and while in competition. A new two-man record was also established. Taking the total of both men for the first five strings they made a score of 1114. The match, which was one of the most interesting ever bowled on the alleys, was won by Wilson with a grand total of 1,073 against 1,053 by his opponent. The scores follow:

McGraw moved forty-five men to Marlin and he cannot hold more than twenty-one after May 1. Several players must be kept on the New York club's payroll because they are under long term contracts, and there is no way to get rid of them except in trades.  
McGraw, in order to get inside of the limit, will carry three catchers, six infielders, four outfielders and eight pitchers. His backstops will be Harry Smith, Meyers and McLean. The infielders to be retained are Mark, Don, Robert, Fletcher, Brainery and Grant. In the outfield the Little Napoleon will have to get along with Burns, Snodgrass, Thorpe and either Murray or Robertson.  
The Giants' pitching staff will comprise Mathewson, Perritt, Tesreau, Marquard, Fromme, Ritter, Schupp, Schauer and perhaps Chalmers. If Chalmers comes back to his old Philadelphia form McGraw may drop one of the other box-men or an extra infielder. It is a foregone conclusion that the Giants' crafty leader intends to work Mathewson, Perritt, Tesreau and Marquard in rotation as long as possible, using the others as relief pitchers.

#### Braves Shut Out Cleveland.

On Wednesday afternoon the Boston Braves defeated the Cleveland Americans by a score of 5 to 0. In the seventh inning Red Smith, the champions' star third sacker, drove out a home run. Maraville, Evers and Schmidt made two sensational double plays.

#### Red Sox Defeated.

The Yankees defeated the Boston Red Sox on Wednesday at their training camp in Hot Springs by 3 to 2. Heinie Wagner, veteran short stop, led the winners and played in his old time form. Not only in the field did Wagner shine, but he made a two-base hit off George Foster, and on his other three times up smashed the ball hard, if not safely. 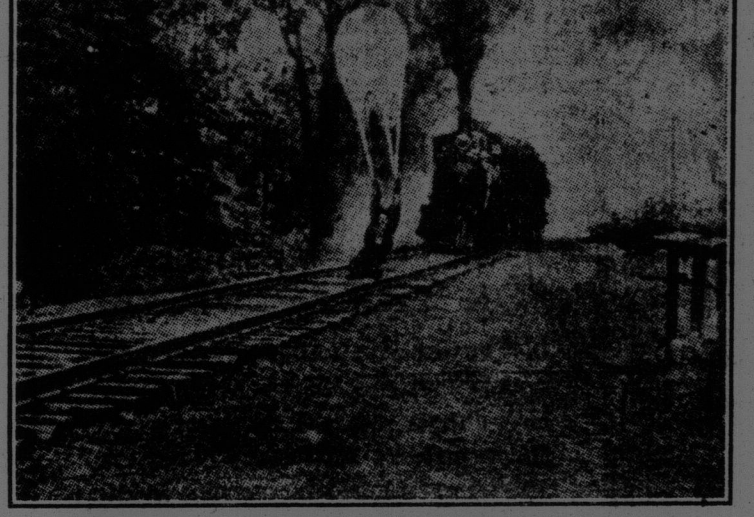
