HOW TO HANG A SKIRT WITHOUT SPOILING.
There is a new and very clever device or measuring a skirt length, and one which-unlike most of these contrivances-may be manipulated without the assistance of a dressmaker or kind friend who will need on the floor while one stands before mirror. The new "skirt hanger" is simply a long rod of steel with a sharp point at one end and a hook at the other, which may be adjusted at any height. If the skirt is to be hung from the top, the rod is inserted into the waistband, and the sharp point is placed at the point where the skirt is to be hung. The rod is then moved up and down until it reaches the desired length. The sharp point is then pushed into the waistband, and the skirt is hung from the rod. This device is especially useful for those who have many skirts and do not have the time or money to have them measured by a dressmaker. It is also useful for those who have skirts that are too long or too short, as it allows them to be adjusted to the correct length. The device is made of steel and is very durable. It is also very easy to use and does not require any special tools. It is a truly innovative and useful invention that every woman who owns a skirt should have.
