Carl Hans Lody, former officer in the German navy and one time resident of the Tower of London, the first person to be executed in that historic place since 1747. He was convicted of posing as an Englishman under the name of Charles L. Inglis and communicating information to the German government. He would not divulge the name of his commanding officer. He refused to be blindfolded, standing with his arms folded when the firing squad of eight men shot him.

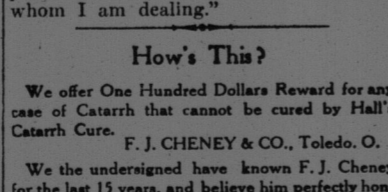
