EIGHT PULLMANS LEAVE TRACK ON WAY TO BAR HARBOR, MAINE

BOY SENDS ENGINE FROM ROUND HOUSE ON FATAL RUNAWAY

The locomotive ran wild through the yards at a speed of forty-five miles an hour and covered three-quarters of a mile before it crashed head-on, into a freight train.

ZEPPELIN PLAN FOR A TRANS-ATLANTIC FLIGHT

Great improvements have been made recently in the Zeppelin type of airship as regards both its speed and stability."
