(Canadian Press) Hamilton, Ont., Aug. 25.—The fifth annual conference of the Association of Canadian Clubs opened here this morning with an attendance of more than 200 delegates representing clubs from coast to coast.

President McClelland in his address lauded C. R. McCullough, founder of the Canadian Club movement, and Clementine Fossenden, originator of Empire Day.

He strongly approved the appointment of a Canadian clergy turning his pulpit into a political hustings, the wondrous whether the separation of church and state in Canada is only in name and not in reality.
