

CITY FATHERS IN WEEKLY SESSION

REFERRED ULTIMATUM TO THE BARRISTER

Communication of the Terminal Railway Company Was Read—Routine Business Disposed of.

The business before the city council Monday was essentially routine in character. The ultimatum of the Victoria Terminal Railway Company, the substance of which appeared in the Times last week, was read and referred to the city barrister. Ald. Stewart expressed himself in favor of paying the bonus, but dictating a heap of trouble for the city if this was not done. As yesterday was the last day of the time limit specified by Vice-President Wood, doubtless a writ will be issued at once.

Mayor Sharpe, of Winnipeg, invited the Mayor and council of Victoria to the Dominion fair in the Prairie City. The invitation was accepted with thanks. Ald. Beckwith inquired for information regarding the fair of 1905.

Mayor Barnard said the matter was in the hands of a joint committee. The Victoria Terminal Railway Company communicated its intention to proceed against the city if the bonus of \$15,000 was not handed over to it within a week from the time the letter was written. This has already been published in the Times.

Ald. Vincent moved that the letter be referred to the city barrister.

Ald. Stewart said he had no hesitation in expressing the opinion that the bonus should be paid, otherwise the city would be involved in a lot of trouble. The motion was carried, Ald. Stewart alone dissenting.

Dr. Fagan, secretary of the provincial board of health, urged the council to take action to prevent expectation in public places.

The letter was referred to the police commissioners.

The water commissioners recommended that 700 feet of two inch pipe be laid on Clara and Davis streets off Oak Bay avenue, and 300 feet on Niagara street. Adopted.

A. T. Goward, local manager of the Electric Railway Company, acknowledged the receipt of the council's communication regarding the placing of a single line of poles along the James Bay causeway. Filed.

R. Layritz renewed his application for facilities to carry off water from his property on Richardson street. Referred to the city engineer for report.

James Leigh & Sons requested the completion of grading on Tupper street. This went to the streets committee.

C. A. Holland urged the widening of a ditch on Fairfield estate. Referred to the city engineer.

H. G. Colasko asked for a sidewalk on the north side of Dallas road between Boyd street and San Juan avenue.

Referred to the city engineer.

F. B. Kito, on behalf of the S. P. C. A. and Natural History Society, pressed the council to prevent the destruction of birds in the park by small boys.

Ald. Goodie said the matter was already in hand, steps having been taken to stop the depredations complained against.

A. W. Currie, on behalf of the Victoria Garrison Artillery Rifle Association, applied for a grant of \$200 towards sending a team to Ottawa. Referred to the finance committee with the recommendation that the request be granted.

A large number of Johnson street merchants petitioned for the paving of that thoroughfare between Government and Wharf streets. Referred to the streets committee.

The finance committee recommended the appropriation of \$2,998 for the usual purposes. Adopted.

The same committee recommended the appropriation of \$2,430 out of the Cook and Fort streets local improvement by-laws; also an appropriation of \$6,500 for the purchase of property on the Arm and \$200 for the option on the remaining land to be acquired. Adopted.

The purchasing agent and Architect Hooper recommended the purchase of books racks for the Carnegie library.

Ald. Beckwith moved that Mr. Carnegie or his agent be asked to supplement his grant by \$2,000 in order that steel shelving could be installed in the building.

Major Barnard disapproved of such a proceeding. He considered it would be infra dig.

Ald. Beckwith took issue with his Worship on the view.

The motion was defeated, and an amendment by Ald. Stewart that the communication be referred to the works committee was carried.

The council then adjourned.

HAPPILY WEDDED.

A quiet wedding was celebrated on Monday afternoon, the contracting parties being Mr. William Lorimer, who numbers among his friends practically every local athlete, particularly in the James Bay district, and Miss Estie M. Arthur, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. Arthur, of San Francisco. The ceremony was performed by Rev. A. Ewing at his residence in the presence of a number of intimate friends and acquaintances. After the marriage Mr. and Mrs. Lorimer left for the Sound on a short honeymoon tour.

Most residents of James Bay have made the acquaintance of Mr. Lorimer, and withal he is exceedingly popular. For years he has conducted a Presbyterian Sunday school in that district, superintending the operation of a Boys' Brigade at the same time. Recently he organized what is known as the Capital City Athletic Association, and for several seasons football and baseball teams from this organization figured prominently in the different leagues. Miss Arthur, the bride, is also well known in Victoria. She attended the Girls' Central and High schools here, both of which she enjoyed and respect of all acquaintances.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

Mr. Justice Drake Will Enjoy Six Months' Vacation—Chambers Case.

Mr. Justice Drake announced in Chambers on Monday that he had been granted six months' leave of absence, during which he would not do any court work. There was one application disposed of. An order was granted in the Bear Valley case staying proceedings pending appeal. This matter is the subject of a dispute among settlers regarding the digging of a ditch in Bear valley. The fence viewers' report on the question, but the report was not satisfactory to some, who appealed. The judge who heard the appeal appointed Mr. Gray, C. E., to report, and this was done, the report being adopted. Now there is an appeal from Mr. Gray's report. On behalf of the appellant, H. D. Helmecken applied for an order staying proceedings pending this appeal. The order was granted.

ANNUAL REPAIRS TO SCHOOL BUILDINGS

Funds Appropriated Have Been Expended in Improvements—Alterations to Old High School.

Members of the buildings and grounds committee of the board of school trustees have been busy since the commencement of the summer vacation superintending the annual repairs to the different buildings. As has been mentioned in these columns, about \$25,000 was appropriated for this purpose, but it has since been found that this sum is insufficient to carry out all the improvements contemplated. One most important work, that of repainting the Central school which has not been attended to for years, has had to be abandoned, at least for a time. The repairs to the old High school building were found to be more extensive than was first estimated, and other details which had to receive attention have drawn upon the funds to a much greater extent than was calculated. Undoubtedly the most important work that has been executed this summer is that in connection with the old High school. An investigation showed that the foundation and floors were both badly in need of attention. The work was undertaken immediately and is now practically completed. It has entailed an expenditure of \$600 or thereabouts.

South Park school has been entirely repainted, and presents a much smarter appearance than previous to the holidays. It was the intention, it will be remembered, to convert this building into a school for the north and south sides of the school in order to provide extra exits in case of emergency. After an inspection, however, it was agreed that this was unnecessary, the students having ample means of reaching the grounds in case of a sudden alarm.

At North Ward school several repairs are in progress, and the school is expected to be completed some days before the school opens. Other improvements are being made to a number of the ward schools.

It is understood that a few feet of the upper portion of the High school grounds have been granted the city council in order to allow the laying of the proposed permanent sidewalk. In return the city will construct new stone wall along the grounds.

At the next meeting of the school committee will be submitted showing just what improvements have been carried through, and those which had to be abandoned. It is understood that if it is possible the funds necessary to carry out the programme as originally intended will be appropriated.

Most of the trustees of the school board, at nothing was decided that was not important, and are therefore expected to insist upon the carrying out of their first plans.

TEXTILE WORKERS STRIKE.

Upwards of 30,000 Operatives in Fall River Factories Quit Work.

Fall River, Mass., July 25.—The strike order issued by the Fall River textile council, calling for upwards of 30,000 operatives to remain away from the mills this morning in protest against a reduction of 12½ per cent. in wages became effective to-day and the response was a general one, as the labor leaders had predicted. In the 37 mills involved in the agreement to reduce wages, but a few comparatively of the usual force went to work. It is estimated that not more than 300 entered all the mill gates to-day.

Both sides admit that this is the beginning of one of the most determined contests which Fall River has ever seen. The mills have been advised to continue to work, but they have tried every plan they could think of to avert a reduction in wages, and to take that final step only when they are forced to do so.

The operatives say that the conditions affecting cotton manufacture will not be remedied by cutting wages.

Reduction in Wages.

Sun Cook, N. H., July 25.—A shutdown of two weeks began here to-day in three cotton mills, which employ about 15,000 operatives. When the mills reopen it will be with a reduction of 12½ per cent in wages.

WILL MAKE EXPLANATION.

Vatican Will Acquaint Catholic Powers With Details of Trouble With French Government.

Rome, July 26.—According to the Patria an answer to the French government with regard to the relations between it and the Vatican was formulated at a meeting of the cardinals. This answer, says the Patria, cannot meet the demands of the French government without surrendering the papal rights. The Italia says that as soon as the answer reaches Minister Delcasse the Pope will address a circular to all the Catholic powers fully explaining the situation. The Observateur Romano, the Vatican organ, denies the report published by the Tribune yesterday that Cardinal Merry Del Val, the Papal secretary of state, had tendered his resignation.

TOURIST TRAVEL WILL INCREASE

CROWDS OF VISITORS EXPECTED IN AUGUST

Large Numbers Coming to Coast From Manitoba and Eastern States—H. Cuthbert Returns.

H. Cuthbert, secretary of the Victoria Tourist Association, who returned last week after making an extended tour of the United States and Canada in the interests of the summer tourist travel, visited among other places Washington, Idaho, Montana, the Kootenay country, Northwest Territories and Manitoba. He returned with a large number of letters of introduction, and a number of other things which will be of great value to the association. He was of the opinion that the travel would continue two months longer than usual, that in spite of the World's Fair Victoria would be called upon to accommodate a large number of visitors during the months of August, September and October, and that next year the inflow of tourists would be exceptionally large.

While there were a great many being attracted from the middle states to the World's Fair, there would be quite a number from that section of the coast later in the season, and a much larger percentage of those who came west would take in Victoria than heretofore. He found very little evidence that a large majority of those who came to the St. Louis exposition from Europe and eastern states would continue their tour of the coast. He was of the opinion that the travel would be a larger number of visitors in the city between the 1st of August and the 1st of December than ever before. This meant that the tourist season would be at least two months longer than has been the case previously.

Referring to his impression of the likelihood of travel from Canadian points, Mr. Cuthbert said that he had no doubt many would come to Victoria to spend their vacations. Over 500 people had only recently left Manitoba and the Territories en route to the city, while several families had sold out with the intention of taking up their residence here.

Continuing, Mr. Cuthbert said: "I find that out of 115 tickets sold in Winnipeg for the coast on July 26, 110 were to Victoria. I am very glad to say that the Winnipeg people are very much in love with Victoria, and all who have met show a disposition to help us. I am sure that we shall have winter rains again this winter, but do not know when. It is gratifying to know that the winter spent in Winnipeg with us last year are loud in their praise of our climate compared with theirs. This business can be cultivated. The principal newspapers devoted considerable space to our work and to the advantages of Victoria. At the same time, the army of men at work on the coast, the depot at Winnipeg, being a practical object lesson of what is to be in Victoria. There is not the least doubt that what this company has done will travel to Victoria that all the other hotels will be filled and making big money before the C. P. R. hotel is any longer a failure. What one of the middle class is travelling a great deal now, and there are ten of these to every first class tourist, so that there is a big chance for our hotel men doing a big business in future. Next year will be a record year, and will take the capacity of every hotel and boarding house in the city. At the same time the police will overlook the fact that August, September, and even October, are likely to be very good months, as there will be more of the coast than at any time this year."

"In my work in Winnipeg I noticed that on many of their residential streets they are going in for a system of asphalt roads, boulevards and concrete sidewalks with shade trees, that are very effective, and which are making Winnipeg a pretty city. They are carried out on the lines that D. R. Kerr suggested for Yates street. A suggestion that was supported, I think, by Stephen Meier, Dr. Garache and others. Thinking that the information might be of use to the citizens, I called at the city hall and had a conversation with the city engineer, who gave me some very interesting facts in connection with these improvements."

"The roads and sidewalks are made by the city engineer; the boulevards by the park board. The street that I inquired about was 66 feet wide, 24 feet between concrete curbs was of asphalt, which costs \$2.25 per square yard. On each side there is a 5-foot concrete sidewalk, which costs \$1.75 per square yard, and 16 feet of boulevard, which costs, sodding and planting with trees, 14 cents per square yard. It is apparent from this that by boulevarding the street the property owner is saved the expense of \$2.25 per square yard, and is only charged 14 cents. An enormous difference to his pocket and also to the city. At the same time there is a beautiful well-paved street, free from dust, that enhances the value of every piece of property on it. A resident of the street told me that there was not a house west of him, before the street was fixed, now there are at least 90 fine residences in two blocks, all built in two years. The boulevards are kept in order by the park board, and the cost is charged annually to the property owner. In every block there are one or two hydrants with a meter, one man cuts and waters the grass as often as it is needed, and what water is used in that block is charged up to the owners pro rata, also the man's time. One man can look after about a quarter of a mile. The cost per year on each 50 feet lot for this service is only \$2.60. The property is always looking well, and it is cheaper than the owner could do it."

"This consideration of things naturally led me to ask if the meter system was in use. 'Yes, sir,' said he, 'we have spent \$60,000 on meters, and it is the best investment the city ever made. We

are now pumping the same amount of water with about 4,000 new connections, that we were before they were made, and the revenue, you can understand, is much higher. We aim simply to prevent waste.' "Their system is this. They charge a universal rate of 15 cents per thousand gallons, and assess every house 20 gallons per day for each room, and the consumer is bound to pay this. A man in a house of seven rooms must pay for 4200 gallons per month, or 60 cents. If they did not do this some people would not use water at all, if they could help it, and their amount gives them sufficient for all ordinary purposes the year round. For every 1,000 gallons over the amount allowed the rate is 20 cents per 1,000. In this way if a man used a little more water in summer in Victoria, he would not be paying more than the flat rate of \$1. Of course I do not express any opinion on these matters, I am simply giving facts as information."

THINKS VICTORIA HAS VERY BRIGHT FUTURE

James Hooper Gives His Impressions to Winnipeg Paper—Island Should Be Developed.

Mr. James Hooper, King's printer for the province of Manitoba, who returned to the province from a month's holiday visit to the Pacific coast, says the Manitoba Free Press. Mrs. Hooper, who accompanied him, and Mr. and Mrs. F. S. Bell, of Dominion City, who were also of the party, have not yet returned. While in the West Mr. Hooper was present at a gathering to celebrate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the marriage of his brother, Mr. Thomas Hooper, architect, of Victoria. Mr. Hooper thinks the coast, Victoria especially, an ideal place to spend a holiday; and that every Canadian should know his country from coast to coast. One most excellent means to that end, he thinks, will be the excursion of Eastern teachers to the Pacific coast this summer.

With regard to business conditions, Mr. Hooper, who had always heard of the business preponderance of Vancouver, was surprised to note the amount of trade centring in Victoria. A good many vessels are unloaded there and their cargoes transferred to cars, are run out to Sidney and taken in on ferries across the Strait to the Mainland. Victoria, situated on the island, has naturally not shared very fully in the general growth on the Mainland, but she will have a great future when the island is fully developed. The fact that a great part of the island is yet scarcely explored astonished Mr. Hooper greatly, and he regards it as certain that the Dominion government should make the island a great business center. Mr. Hooper was at Victoria at the time of the opening of the salmon season. That has been of especial interest this season, the new regulation allowing the use of traps being in use for the first time on the Canadian side. The very first trap was laid off Sooke, near Victoria, something over a week ago, and the first catch was ten thousand salmon. At the same time the amount of fish landed at the mouth of the Fraser, this is contended, goes to prove that the best and earliest salmon run to the river is past the island and along the Canadian coast rather than along the American coast. This would tend to make the island in the future the most important packing industry in connection with the salmon packing industry.

Mr. Hooper visited Vancouver, New Westminster and Seattle and took a run over part of the island as well.

LILLOOET OPENED. By-election Will Take Place on August 16th—Candidates in the Field.

The provincial government has decided to try its chances in the constituency of Lillooet. Nominations are to take place on August 1st, and the election will be held on August 16th. A party of priests will be opened. The contest will be a short one, but both candidates are already in the field.

The Conservatives will be represented by Archibald McDonald, who, in view of the importance of retaining the seat for the government, consented to become the candidate. He is acknowledged to be the only man on the side who has a fighting chance in Lillooet. He is personally respected, but with the record of the present administration, in whose interests alone he is running, it is difficult to understand how he can be elected.

He is opposed by Mr. Stoddart, who has been before the public in that constituency before, and who is a man who has been in the party, which has protested in the interests of the people against the iniquitous legislation introduced by the present administration.

All the forces of the government will be used in an attempt to win the election. Already the Premier has called on the constituency with fair promises to the electors.

SALE OF LOTS. Property Near Fountain Changes Hands—Considerable Building Activity.

There is considerable building activity in the vicinity of the Fountain, a fact that becomes at once patent to anyone making a trip in that direction. The late Mr. McCandless sold six choice residential lots on Douglas street, just this side of the junction to Wm. McCarter. The purchaser intends to erect four modern cottages without loss of time. Just back of this property, on Government street, Jno. Worthington is building a residence, while opposite the Fountain home of Mr. Walker, of the city police, is erecting a two-story home. A residence was recently erected in this locality for Mr. Heisterman, and it is expected that more will follow those mentioned. The people of the Work Estate soon will be in closer touch with certain suburban districts than they were before.

The extension of the Equivocal train line along Government to Bay street will give them direct communication with the naval village and along the route which is bound to prove highly beneficial. It will also give them an alternate service to the city.

WILL BUILD TRAP AT CLOVER POINT

VANCOUVER HAS THE PROJECT IN HAND

He Will Experiment This Year and Build Permanent Works if Successful.

B. J. Short, a Fraser river cannerman and a resident of Vancouver, has been in the city for the past few days arranging for a fish trap to be constructed at Clover Point. The locality is just above the rifle range off the Dallas road, and just beyond the city limits. He purposes putting up only a temporary structure at present with a view to securing some at least of the run of sockeyes which pass these shores.

To fully equip in preparation for a big business would be an impossibility this season. All that Mr. Short hopes to accomplish now is to thoroughly exploit the territory so that another year he will be in a position to erect more permanent works. He has come to the conclusion, according to some with whom he has discussed the matter, that Vancouver Island will henceforth be the centre of the fishing industry. He has watched with interest the working of the traps already planted down the Straits, and cannot but realize that Vancouver Island trap will have an advantage over all others for the interception of fish coming up the Strait of San Juan de Fuca.

The traps at Otter Point and at Sooke have been catching fish in good quantity for several weeks, while the cannermen on the Fraser complain of a dearth of salmon. These conditions are what have attracted Mr. Short in his present decision. During his short stay in Victoria he has been very busy arranging for the construction of the trap. The site he has selected is believed to be a good one. That there is an abundance of salmon off the Strait Island neighborhood every Victorian who has done any trolling will at once admit. There is a very strong tide rip at the point. The fish pass in their migration to the Fraser in great numbers.

Mr. Short is not the first cannerman, either on the provincial Mainland or on Pigeon Sound, who has put on his thinking cap since the Dominion government extended the right to fish with the use of traps in these waters, and his advent in the business will, it is hoped, mark the coming of a new era in the fishing industry. Mr. Short returned to the Mainland last night. While here he made the Dominion hotel his headquarters.

SCARCITY OF FISH. Salmon Are Running Poorly on West Coast—The Queen City's Return.

Salmon have been running very poorly on the West Coast of this island, according to news received through the return of the steamer Queen City Wednesday. Not for many years has the run been so poor for the month of July. The canner at Clayoquot has a very small pack, and from other sources it would appear as if the principal run is to the Fraser inlet. There has been more salmon seen there than at any other point on the coast.

The Queen City has been down to Cape Scott. She found there that nearly all the colonists had gone to the Northern fishing grounds. From Quatsno the ship brought back a full load of lumber, which she will discharge here. A party of priests will be opened. The contest will be a short one, but both candidates are already in the field.

Other arrivals were F. B. Apollis, who has been down the coast looking for a home; G. Nordstrom, G. Keithley, Mr. Baker, Mr. Hobbie, F. R. On the trip down the coast the Queen City had as passengers a party of pulp land surveyors, Mr. Jones, a representative of the Kanaia City Zinc Company, who has come up to inspect the property adjoining the June group before the British Columbia government has instructions to sink a shaft to a depth of 90 feet on the Edson property for testing purposes.

CATHEDRAL REOPENED. Important Gathering at Armagh Upon the Occasion—Rioting Followed.

Armagh, Ireland, July 25.—An enormous concourse from all parts of Ireland was present yesterday at the ceremony of the reopening of Armagh cathedral after four years' work of re-decoration, which included the covering of the entire walls with mosaic pictures.

Cardinal austral, legate of Pope Pius and many Irish and foreign prelates, the Duke and Duchess of Norfolk, John Redmond, John Dillon, Timothy Healy and other prominent persons were present.

Somewhat rioting of Orangemen and Catholics followed the ceremonies. Shots were fired and the police were stoned.

BOUND FOR LHASSA. Col. Younghusband Will Only Make Peace After Reaching Destination.

Nagartse, Thibet, July 20, (delayed in transmission).—The Thibetan delegates met the British mission and professed willingness to arrange a peace if the mission would return to Grangtse.

Colonel Younghusband replied that he could only make peace at Lhasa, but that he was willing to discuss terms while proceeding there.
