BERLIN, March 16—A curious case has been decided in Augsburg in connection with the German employers liability laws. A workman named Glaser, employed in a color and varnish works, was bitten on the arm by a mosquito. The bite festered, bloodpoisoning set in and the arm had to be amputated.

He brought his case before a mixed council of employers and workmen's representatives, which decided against him, on the ground that this was an accident to which any one might have been liable, and was in no way connected with Glaser's work, Glaser appealed to the arbitrators, which the law provides, and the case was finally decided in his favor. He will be paid for the rest of his life an annuity amounting to 45 per cent. of his wages.

The arbitrators decided that mosquitoes in paint and varnish works in all probability were more poisonous than other mosquitoes, and that the ordinary rule applying to mosquito bites did not apply in Glaser's case.
