## GREAT DREDGING PLAN WILL SHORTLY BE ANNOUNCED

**Government Will Construct Wharves Below Sand Point**  
—The Beacon Bar to be Cleared Away at Once

The Star has reason to believe that in very short time—probably within two weeks—the greatest work ever undertaken in St. John harbor will be started. This work is the clearing of the Beacon bar, the first step towards the extension of West Side wharriage accommodation below Sand Point. The job will be an immense one and it will ultimately involve the removal of the whole bar which has been in close touch with the government are now confident that a definite policy of harbor extension has been adopted and that this contract will be awarded just as soon as surveys are completed. Tenders may be called within the next few weeks.

Below the C.P.R. wharf the railway company owns sixteen hundred feet of shore front. This so long as it remains in the possession of the C.P.R. will not be touched but the first contract will start immediately below the C.P.R.'s wharves. The latter will receive attention when, as is expected, it comes under control of the harbor commission.

The Dominion Dredging Co.'s dredge having finished all its work in Rodney basin, week or ten days ago at Nova Scotia. The Beaver is still at work clearing up some tritling odds and ends on an old contract in the basin which will take only a few days longer. By the end of next week all the dredging between Sand Point and the ferry wharf will thus be finished.
