Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 30 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

OFFICE OF TOURIST ASSO. DELUGED WITH INQUIRIES

If the application list of the Tourist Association may be regarded in the light of a barometer the tide of summer travel that has only begun to surge eastward will undoubtedly sweep away all records of former years. For some time the local office has been deluged with inquiries from prospective travelers. And it is practically certain that the accommodations of the province will set a limit to the throngs. As is generally experienced the most recent magazine articles on New Brunswick villages that dot the shores of New Brunswick are so assured of the success of visitors.

Unfortunately the city will not be in a position to offer the accommodation of former years, and with the rush on in earnest there will undoubtedly be many who will have to be turned away. The Tourist Association, however, is doing everything in its power to cope with the anticipated crowds and with the limited funds at its disposal, due in most part to the council's action in cutting down the civic grant by half.

Perhaps the greatest advertisement that New Brunswick has fallen heir to for some time is the hunting trip last fall of Hon. Chas. Scott, a prominent citizen of Rosedale, Mississippi, and perhaps the largest cotton planter in the world. Mr. Scott had a most successful hunt and was so delighted with his outing that he has written several magazine articles on New Brunswick. One of them published by the Red and Gun was distributed in large quantities at the Sportsmen's Show held in Boston and New York during the winter, and is also being circulated by the Canadian Pacific Railway.

As a direct result of the writings of Mr. Scott numerous enquiries have been received relative to the sport in the province, and the articles are proving a strong factor in directing summer travel to New Brunswick.

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
