Eastern S. S. Lines

TO AID GOVERNMENT

OF UNITED STATES

Understood Part of Fleet will

Be Used for War Purposes

—Steamer Belfast already

Taken Over.

It is understood that some of the

vessels of the Eastern Steamship

Lines are being taken over by the

United States government for war

purposes. The company now owns

the large fleet of upwards of thirty

vessels, formerly the property of the

Eastern Steamship Corporation. As

the war is expected to reduce summer

traffic to certain places it is probable

that the company will lose nothing

by the transfer of part of its fleet to

the government.

On the other hand it is thought

that freight traffic will be very heavy

and the officials are said to be some-

what uncertain regarding the size of

business. It is not known whether

the Calvin Austin, Governor Cobb,

Governor Dingley or North Star, ves-

sels which come to St. John, will be

used by the American authorities, but

it is learned that the steamer Belfast

has already been taken over by the

government.

Scores of Moose Visit

G. T. P. Line During

Heavy Snow Storm

Montreal, April 11.—Reports received

at Grand Trunk Pacific headquar-

ters, from Superintendent Kirkpatrick,

at Jasper, tell of remarkable vis-

its to the railway line of large herds

of moose.

A very heavy fall of snow between

McBride and Prince George, British

Columbia, on the main line of the

Grand Trunk Pacific, made it very dif-

ficult for moose and caribou to find

feed. With the surrounding country

covered with a mantle of snow ten

feet deep, the animals came down to

the railway track, and the operating

men had considerable difficulty in

getting them off the right-of-way.

"When passing over the line with

the snow plow," writes Supt. Kirk-

patrick, "I personally counted over

fifty moose in different places on the

track, and we had to delay trains to

avoid killing them. We did kill six

or seven moose, but this was unavoid-

able as the animals ran some distance

ahead of the train, then turned and

charged the engine. There were some

very humorous as well as painful in-

cidents. Two buck moose ran ahead

of our snow plow for about two miles,

finally turned and charged the plow at

full speed. The moose were not killed,

however, as the snow from the plow

piled them up and threw them

about fifty feet from the track. We

watched them make their way down

through the snow to the river, ap-

parently unhurt."
