The Responsibility of a Directorate to be Tested-A Suit for \$79,000 Damages, Etc.

Gold miners and those interested in mining operations will be interested in a peculiar suit that has just been entered in the Supreme Court in Nel-

Mr. Ernest Manfield, capitalist and mining promo er, has rought suit a ainst Rena Laudi. Jules savage, Charles Frederick de Bailliencour and Ferdinand de Bailliencourt, all of whom live in France, for damage to the amount of nearly \$80,000. This mining lawsuit is one of the

mest interesting that has ever been brought before the courts of British Columbia, as it involves various questions of extreme importance. It is a question between the directors of a company and the manager of the properties operated by that company. It is a question where the company did not advance the necessary money to operate the property, the conse quence of which serious damages to he manager will try to be proven Similar cases have happened before out none so serious as this where the manager was thrown into prison for the company's debt. He also asks for an injunction restraining defendants from disposing of his interests in the property, and he also asks for the cancellation of his contract with the company owing to their breach of contract that they had made.

The last claim that he makes is for damages to the amount of \$15,000 for this breach of contract in not furnishing the necessary funds to work the mines, and they were therefore closed down, and, of course, not only Mr. Mansfield, but all the stockholders, will not receive any income from them as the result.


