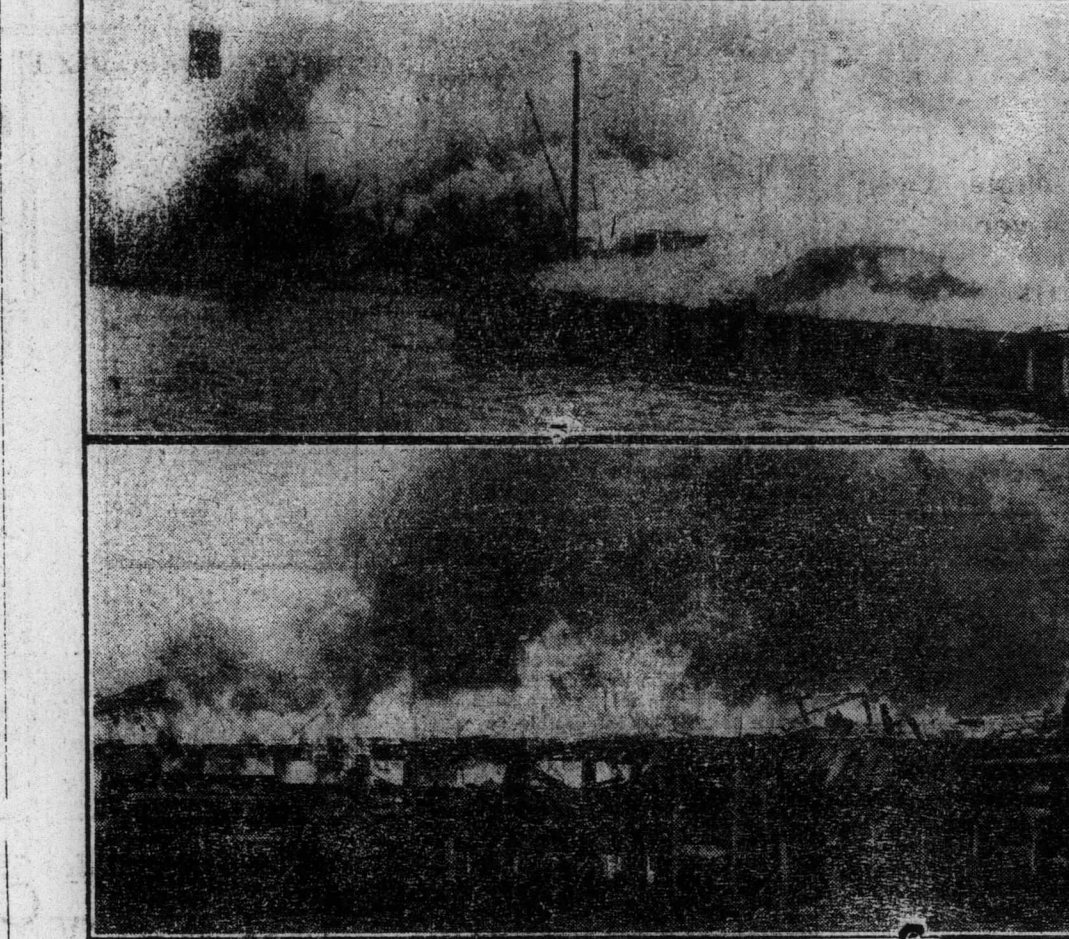

How Did French Troops Take Villages on Somme Front? They Walked in

Resistance Utterly Broken Down at Hem and Curly in Thorough Artillery Preparation—5 Men Wounded in a Whole Brigade.

Lyons, France, Aug. 2.—The terrific results of French shell fire were described by Albert Thomas, under secretary of the minister of war, in addressing a gathering of workers in munition factories here. "During the long months we have just passed through," he said, "there have been hours when a slight mistake or misunderstanding existed between citizens doing their duty in the interior of the country and those fulfilling the nobler and more dangerous task on the front. It was said that the workers slackened, and did not supply the army with all it needed. Well, he is a pleasant fact we observed recently on the Somme. When the 29th corps, the colonial corps, entered first into the villages of Hem and Curly and when they carried Monacu Farm do you know how they entered? Not by assault, not in risking all the infantry. No, they walked, as the soldiers said to me a few days ago, came in hand, through the village, or rather through an immense sea of broken red brick which represented the village and in a movement of gratitude and friendship, their thoughts turned towards their comrades in the rear.

CONTINUES TO ADVANCE IN EAST AFRICA

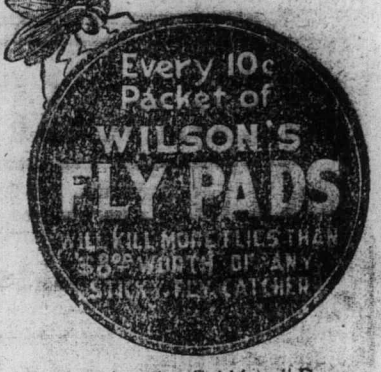
General Smuts Occupies Pangani and Clears Country South of Railway.

London, August 2.—British troops operating in German East Africa have occupied the port of Pangani on the east coast, says an official statement given out to-night. The Anglo-Belgian forces in the region of Lake Victoria Nyanza are reported to be making progress. The statement follows: "Lieut.-Col. Vandeventer took 4,000 head of excellent cattle while advancing on Dodoma. Further east Major-Gen. Hoskins has been clearing the country south of the Usunbara railway. Disease Which Caused Such Ravages in Serbia Is Finally Mastered.

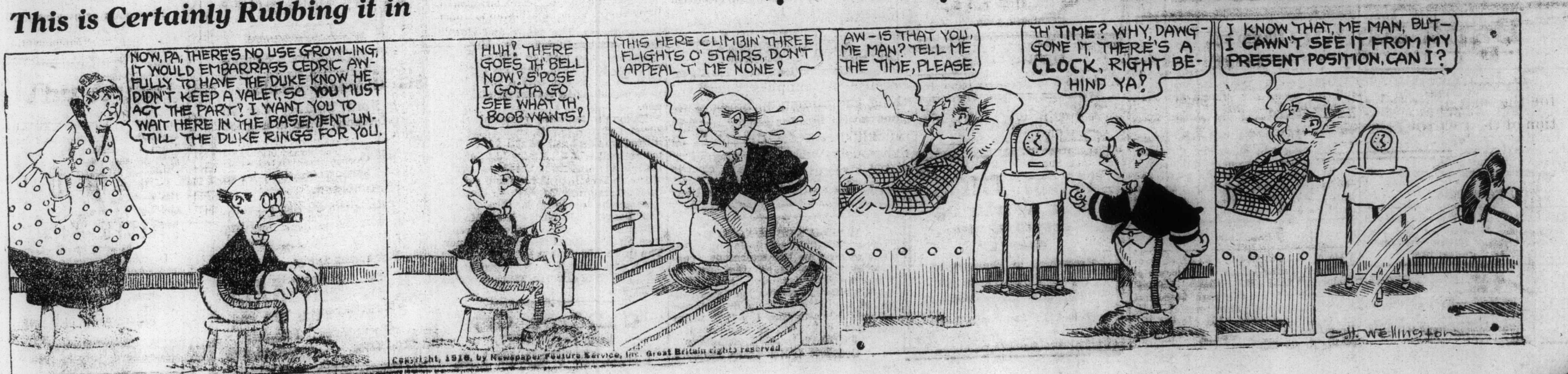
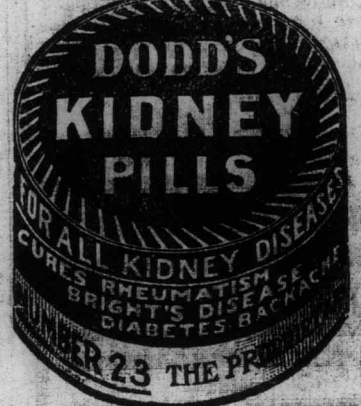
Paris, August 2.—A cure of curptive typhus, the disease which such terrible ravages in Serbia, has been discovered by Drs. Nicolle and Blaisot. The physicians described their discovery to the Academy of Medicine. It is a serum which they found after exhaustive experiments. So far thirty-eight serious cases have been treated by injections which were followed by rapid recovery in a number of patients. In addition the injections of the serum prevented complications so frequent in this disease and reduced the death rate from twenty-five to three per cent.
