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 didn't want to have it; so I told him that where the opportunity was there, available, he should accept it; and he refused it.

Q-503 So, still being in the Army, and refusing an operation, there is nothing more you can do for him, is there?

A- There is nothing more than that.

Q-504 So that the only thing he can do is carry on?

A- If he refuses an operation he is to carry on in category "A-1."

---The Defending Officer declines to re-examine.

---BY THE COURT:

Q-505 Major McLean, if a man in the condition, as you know the accused, should appear on sick parade before you and complain of headaches, would you say what you would be likely -- would suggest for him, or give him?

A- If he complained of headaches I would naturally investigate the sinus first. That is the usual cause of headaches.

Q-506 You know -- it is a case that you do know of -- you have the report -- and he complained of headaches. Now, would you give him any treatment or something to sooth?

A- He would probably be treated by a sedative. I would first investigate the cause of the headaches. It might be due to constipation; might be due to poison, a toxic condition. If it was due to sinus he would be referred to Hamilton.

Q-507 That already being done?

A- I might say that was done on the man's own statement rather than my own opinion. If a man comes in and complains to me -- he might have had sinus at one time and not have it now -- and complains of a headache and gives the history of having had sinus, I would investi-
