THAT RIVER

Capt. Sullivan of the Corisande, another Trader who is Anxious for the Dredging.

Captain Sullivan, of the "Corisande," a schooner from Sarnia that came up the river this morning, is another great lake mariner who would be glad to see the River Thames dredged out. He has just made a trip from Parry Sound to Chatham with a cargo of 411,000 feet of lumber for Wm. Drader.

The "Corisande" draws over eleven feet of water and fortunately for her there was a swell at the mouth of the river when she came through this morning or she would have had to lighten her cargo before she came across the bar and also struck bottom at the bar and also struck several places in coming up the river.

The "Corisande" is a three mast schooner and a good sailer. She made the trip from Parry Sound to Chatham in six days, which is considered good time. She had a very nasty trip but stood the weather well, this being her first voyage. The weather was rough during nearly all of the voyage, with rain, hail and strong winds.

In Georgian Bay she ran into large fields of ice which delayed her progress for some time but out on the open lake she made good time.

In the face of all the complaints made it is surely time that something was done to provide immediate relief from the trouble experienced by sailors at the mouth of the river. If matters are allowed to go on this way by default, next year schooners will not be able to come up to Chatham.

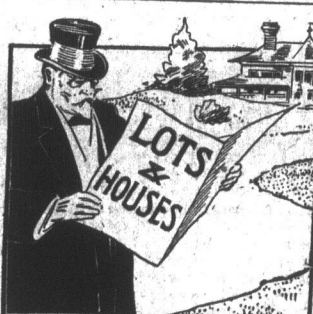
