

EASTER SUNDAY

The worship of the goddess Easter, which was deeply rooted in Northern Germany, was carried to England by the Saxons. Early church history states that Easter was identical in date with the passover, as indeed the two festivals were derived from the same root.

Originally the Easter festivities covered a period of eight days, afterwards changed to three days, and finally to one, as we have it now.

The connection of the rabbit and the eggs with Easter comes from Germany. During the Easter season in that country the hare is of almost as much importance as is "St. Nicholas" at Christmas time.

Gift making at Easter was formerly confined to cards, conveying kind wishes for a joyous Eastertide. To-day it is the custom to send some present to those best loved.

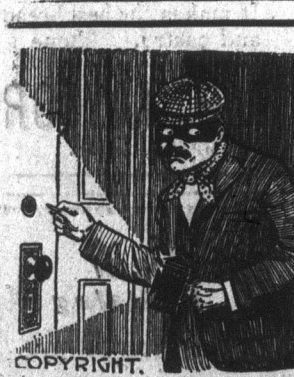
