WINNIPEG MARKET LETTER

(Offee of The Grain Growers' Grain!Company Limited, January ?\$, 1914)

Wheat—A strong wheat market has developed here during the last half of this week, encouraged by strength of foreign and American markets, with the result that influential houses took the buying side, the market closing around the high point of the week. Bull news was freely circulated and everything possible was brought to bear to influence short interests to cover. Late Argentine news is anything but encouraging and the exportable surplu's is now estimated a little under sixty million bushels; there was further bullish reports concerning the outturn of the crop, all of which created a strong tone in foreign markets and domestic markets gained in response. Continental markets have been irregular. Liverpool gained over a penny for the week, Paris one to two pennies higher, Berlin remains unchanged. Chicago and Minneapolis hearly one cant up, and our market has gained slightly over one cent for May and about one and a half cents for the cash article. Japan-has been a steady taker of Australian supplies. Exporters in this market are reporting a good businges done this past week in the East. Chicago also reports that three-quarters of a million cash wheat was worked during the last forty-eight hours and that foreigners are enquiring keenly-after-our article, meeting every advance.

The crop situation has changed but little during the week; in Europe, excepting the extreme South, the crop situation is generally favorable and the weather seasonable; whilst in the U.S., the promise of the winter wheat crop is still very high, some Chicago operators talking of a likely winter wheat crop next June of 700 million bushels. However, it has a long way to go yet before it is safely harvested and housed, and doubtless will again have to go thru the usual "scares," Only vesterday, there was considerable uncasiness existing inasmuch as there is little or no sowo covering, and much cold weather. ### Winnipeg Live Stock Stockyard Receipts

Receipts at the new Union yards last week amounted to 591 cattle and 7,588 hogs. At the C.P.R. yards, the receipts equalled 516 cattle, 18 calves and 4,030 hogs. Altogether the total receipts at Winnipeg were 1,107 cattle, 18 calves and 11.618 hogs. The corresponding week last year had total receipts of 617 cattle, 24 calves and 3,359 hogs. 3,359 hogs.

The cattle supply fell away down last week, barely 1,100 being received at both stockyards together. The trade was fairly good and quite recovered the decline on many grades noted last

week. Some real choice steers are selling up to \$7.50 and superfine quality might fetch still higher prices. Good heifers are worth \$6.50 to \$6.75, and good cows from \$6.00 to \$6.25, or even hetter. Oxen were also in better demand, some good lots fetching \$5.50. Stockers and feeders are scarce. Stock steers of the right kind would sell up to 6 cents. Milkers and springers are not much wanted and are worth more in the country than on the market. Best yeals are \$6.00 to \$7.50.

Hogs
Last week saw another extra big supply of hogs on the Winnipeg stockyards, over 11,000 altogether, of which the Union yards handled about two-thirds. The demand kept very good and strong all week, both from the local packers and from Eastern sources. For a time the choice hogs commanded \$8 25, fed and watered, at the Union yards, and \$8 35 off cars at the C.P.R. yards. But with the new week, the continued heavy receipts knocked off this extra quarter and prices on Monday were the same as the previous Monday. \$8 00.

Sheep and Lambs
None of these came to hand and quotations are unchanged, \$7 00 to \$7 50 for choice lambs, and \$5 00 to \$5 50 for best killing sheep.

Butter

Dairy butter has declined another cent or two except on the fancy dairy, which still remains at 23 cents. It retails for 30 cents. No. 1 dairy is down to 18-20 cents, cdmpared with 25 cents a year ago, and good round lots 16-17 cents. The market is still heavily overstocked, both locally and in Eastern and Southern cities, and as there is no outlet from that quarter, the price is down, and dealers are puzzled to know what the outcome will be. New Zealand butter is another depressing factor on the local market, as it can be laid down in Winnipeg for about 31 cents.

Eggs

Figgs

Manitoba strictly new-laids are scarce again, but the dealers maintain the 35-cent quotation to the country. Minnesota fresh eggs are being imported largely, as the Manitoba supply falls away below local requirements. Candled eggs are worth 30 cents. Retail prices on the new laid eggs range from 50 to 60 cents

#### Potatoes

While it is thought that there are plenty of potatoes in the country, not many farmers are shipping these days and city dealers have hard work to get all they need. Prices are up to 75-90 cents per bushel, in sacks, retailing at \$1.20-\$1.40 a bushel.

A small quantity of dressed poultry is still being received by Winnipeg firms, and prices remain unchanged from last week.

Dressed beef seems to be getting scarcer, and the 12 cents a pound now paid by local butchers will probably advance before long. Dressed mutton is 12\frac{1}{2} cents, dressed veal 13 cents, and dressed lamb 15 cents. Dressed pork, worth 10 cents, is plentiful.

Milk and Cream

Supplies from the country are still keeping up well, but are not as heavy as a week or two ago, when the weather was mild and open. No change in the schedule of prices has been made no; will be made for another week. The butter situation is so hard to forecast that creamery men cannot yet say whether the next change in milk and cream prices will be up or down. Usually, at this season, an advance is made, but dairy butter being 6 cents or so lower than it was last year at this time, the butter-fat prices must correspond.

No change in hay prices. Stocks are heavier than a week ago, as the deliveries have been fairly heavy. A steady market is looked for.
