"READY FOR EMERGENCIES"

LONDON, Aug. 17.—The War Office and Dublin Castle are getting the British war machine into shape for eventualities. Officers and men of the military police and Black and Tans have been recalled from leave and ordered to report at their depots immediately.

Officially it is stated that "We are getting ready for emergencies." Preparations are being made to call new levies. It is predicted that if the Stan Fein open new hostilities 150,000 troops will be thrown across the Irish Sea within a few months for the occupation of the southern districts.

Mr. A. F. White Buys Fine Property on Queen Street

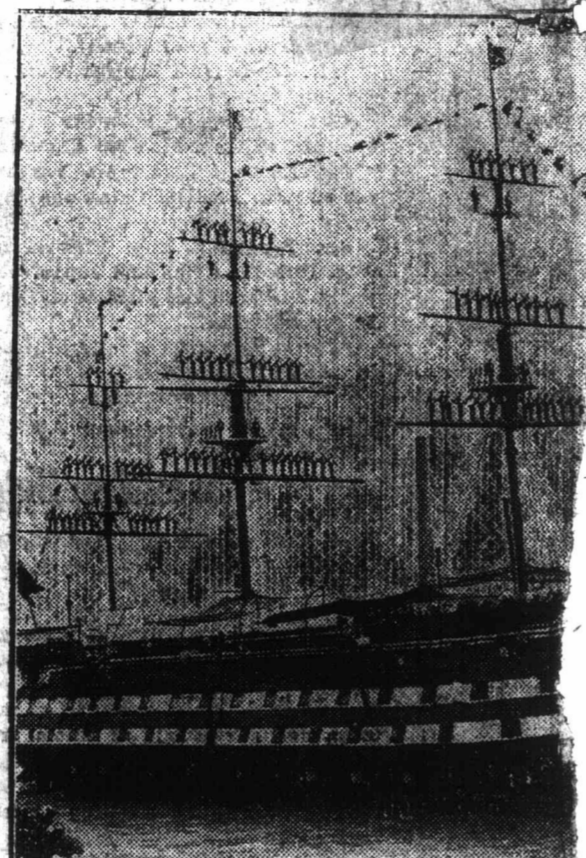

DRUNKENNESS ON INCREASE; WAR-PERIOD OF SOBRIETY FOLLOWED BY OVER-DOSE

LONDON, July 30.—(By Mail)—Drunkenness increased by over 65 per cent. in England during last year, according to official licensing statistics. The reaction after the war-period of sobriety was shown by 95,763 convictions, compared with 57,948 in 1919. There were only 29,075 convictions in 1918. The convictions of women were 38 per cent. more than in 1919, and more than double the total of 1918.

FIRE AT "THIEF" RAIL SITE IT WAS HIS WIFE NOT CLE.

Young Detroit Man Later Surrenders to Police in State of Collapse

DETROIT, Aug. 17.—Mistaking her for a burglar, Howard Swope killed his wife, Leta, mother of two babies, with a shotgun early yesterday in their home, 38 Cora street, River Rouge. He surrendered to the police, and after telling his story in the prosecutor's office, was released on his personal recognizance.

WIFE DID NOT KNOW IT

Swope said he and his wife, about two o'clock in the morning, heard a noise, and Swope got up to investigate, arming himself with a gun. Through the kitchen window he saw a shadow and a hand. He fired, then ran to his wife's room and shouted that he had shot a thief and was going to call neighbors. He then discovered that his wife was not in bed. A neighbor found the body in the yard, the charge of birdshot having entered the back at close range. The police were called, and Swope, in a state of collapse, was taken in charge.

WIFE DID NOT KNOW IT

Swope, who is 30 years old, is employed by the Detroit Edison Company. His wife was 24 years old.

Three had "Accidents" in Queen City District Stir People to Anger

Another Woman May Die From Injuries When Hit by Automobile

TORONTO, Aug. 17.—Three fatalities which involved other motorists in this district stirred feelings to a high pitch today and police action followed swiftly in all cases.

WOMAN, MAN, KILLED

One Woman Killed.

Mrs. George Armstrong, of Burlington Road, Mimico, was instantly killed in an accident which occurred on the Toronto-Hamilton Highway last night, and Mrs. Brown, also of Mimico, who was staying at the home of her mother, Mrs. Woolfrey, Summerhill Road, was very seriously injured, sustaining fractured ribs, possibly a fracture of a leg, near the thigh, and many scratches and bruises, when struck down by another motor car in an accident which occurred only a block or two further along the Highway. Both accidents occurred within about one hour, the one in which Mrs. Brown was injured taking place at 9 o'clock and the one in which Mrs. Armstrong was killed at 10:15 o'clock.

The car which knocked down Mrs. Armstrong was driven by Mr. Clarence Ludgate, of New Toronto. He was arrested by County Constable George Simpson, on a charge of manslaughter, taken before Magistrate D. Davidson and had to furnish bail of \$10,000 before being released.

Mrs. Brown was knocked down by a car driven by Mr. John Fenwick of Clarkson, but he was not held.

WOMAN, MAN, KILLED

Man Under Wrecked Car.

Gerald O'Flaherty, Hotel Cecil, Toronto, aged 35 years, was instantly killed when the car in which he was riding turned turtle on the Toronto-Hamilton Highway one-half mile west of Aldershot. Thomas Houston, 14 Lake Front, Toronto, driver of the car, is held on a charge of criminal negligence, and another occupant of the car escaped by going across the fields. Whether he is injured or not, the police do not know, but they are still searching for him. Houston was slightly cut and his face bruised and his clothes were stained with blood from O'Flaherty's wounds.

The police allege that the three had been drinking, but a search revealed no liquor in the car. It was wrecked almost beyond repair. The automobile is owned by Houston.

Witnesses told the police who responded to the call that the automobile was travelling at an excessive rate of speed along the highway, and at a point half a mile from Aldershot left the cement surface and finally went into the ditch at the right hand side. The driver in an attempt to get back to the road, pulled the steering wheel so hard that the jar of the rough road snapped the right front wheel from its case and the front part of the car dropped to the ground. The axle drove down into the ground with such force that the machine was thrown completely over and the occupants were thrown out. The car fell on O'Flaherty and he received terrible injuries. The party had been in Hamilton and was on the way home to Toronto. The car faced Hamilton after the accident.

ORANGEVILLE, Aug. 17.—While motoring home from Orangeville James McEwing of Drayton, adjuster and general manager of the Peel and Maryborough Mutual Fire Insurance Co., had a fatal heart seizure and expired in his car. He was accompanied by his daughter, Miss Nellie, who was driving the car at the time. She thought her father had fainted and drove into Mr. Eilon Fern's farm house for assistance. Here it was found that life was extinct.
